Public Domain Day 2026

As we welcome the new year, 2026 gives us another reason to celebrate: [Public Domain Day](#). It's better known as New Year's Day, but it is a celebration of copyrights expiring on certain works from the past (books, movies, music, etc.).



What is the public domain? According to the [United States Copyright Office](#), a "work of authorship is in the 'public domain' if it is no longer under copyright protection or if it failed to meet the requirements for copyright protection. Works in the public domain may be used freely without the permission of the former copyright owner."

On [January 1, 2026](#), copyrighted works in the United States from 1930 and sound recordings from 1920 entered the public domain. This included books from William Faulkner, Agatha Christie, T. S. Eliot, and Sigmund Freud, along with the first four "[Nancy Drew](#)" books, [The Little Engine That Could](#), and [The Maltese Falcon](#) (the book, not the famous 1941 film starring Humphrey Bogart).

"Octopus Moon" by Bobbie Pyron Reviewed by Tammy Kruger

Fifth grader Pearl Graham does not feel like herself. Everything seems to have changed over the summer, and she feels engulfed by a heavy, dark fog all the time. After speaking to a therapist -- against Pearl's wishes -- she is diagnosed with depression. That part of her that feels broken finally has a name...but what is she to do about it? As changes keep entering her world, the heaviness becomes harder to bear.



This middle grades novel-in-verse offers insight into mental illness and how "perfect lives" can disguise darkness underneath. The topic is a heavy one, but it is handled in both a realistic and hopeful manner. Pearl's family and friends do not always understand how to help her, but they continue to show up with love. (My favorite phrase from this book is "Love is a verb".)

The author, Bobbie Pyron, experiences depressive episodes herself, so this book is autobiographical in nature. It also comes with an Author's Note of how (and where) to get help for mental health struggles. *Octopus Moon* can be found on Libby.

LEGO Braille Bricks

LEGO Braille Bricks are 3-dimensional bricks with braille dots and printed letters or numbers designed to teach people how to read braille. A variety of number and letter bricks, along with mathematical operation symbols (plus sign, subtraction sign, etc.) and punctuation bricks (upper case, comma, period, etc.) are placed on the base plates to spell words and create mathematical problems.

Did you ask for an electric drill, a craft set, a certain board game, or a fishing pole for Christmas and did Santa ignore your request? Don't fret- try checking your local library for what you wanted! Yes, you'll have to return it after you're done using it, but maybe once you try that board game, you'll learn it's too involved for your young kids. Or once you're done with the drill, you'll realize that you like not having to find a place to store it!

Often, libraries call these kinds of collections "Library of Things," and North Dakota libraries have some exciting items being lent to their patrons.

- Sports items like pickleball racquets, disc golf sets, fishing poles, and life jackets.
- Tools like wrenches, engravers, ladders, paint rollers, and wheelbarrows.
- Things for your home like framed art prints, radon detectors, power use monitors, ice cream makers, stand mixers, food dehydrators, apple slicer-peelers, cookie cutters, and air fryers.
- Fun things like giant and regular-sized board games, jigsaw puzzles, loom knitting kits, video games, and ghost detector kits.
- Items to help you be creative like sewing machines, knitting kits, ring lights, camera tripods, and mobile hotspots.
- Kits for kids that include NASA kits, flash cards, robot kits, fairy tale kits, rock tumblers, and STEM kits.
- Party items like banquet tables, slide projectors, blow up movie screens, canopy tents, and cake pans for fun birthday cakes.
- Outdoor use items like metal detectors, ladder golf games, outdoor exploration kits, tents, camping stoves, bike pumps, bike repair kits, and snowshoes.
- Health related items like blood pressure cuffs and light therapy lamps.
- Activity passes to enter state parks and museums.

Libraries loan so much more than just books, DVDs, and ebooks. Check your local library, or the State Library, to see what unique items are available!
