WHY YOU HAVE NOT RECEIVED BOOKS

If you have not received books, and you are wondering why, here are some possible explanations. More than one may apply to your situation:

You Have Not Requested Any Books

You have selected the type of service where you receive only the specific books you have requested (Request Only). The receiving of books depends on you sending or calling in a book request. Please be aware, that some of your requests may not be available. You need to provide an adequate number of requests to meet your reading needs.

Your Request List Needs To Be Expanded

This means that your book request list cannot support your reading needs. For example, you have requested new and very popular titles that are in high demand. It may be that many of the books you have requested are on loan to other patrons. If you are an avid reader, your request list needs to contain an adequate number of titles from which to select.

You Have Not Returned A Book

You have selected the type of service where books are sent when you have returned books (Turn Around). If you have not returned any of the books that are currently checked out to you, no new books will be sent to you. It is best to return each book as you finish. This will prompt a new book being sent out, and you should never be without books.

Your Personal Maximum Number Of Books Is Too Low

Currently, the maximum number of digital books you can have checked out at any given time is 10. If your personal maximum number is lower than 10, you will not receive any new books until you have returned books. If you feel that your personal maximum is too low, you may want to contact Talking Books to increase your maximum number of books allowed.

Your Reading Interests Need To Be Increased

You have selected the type of service where Talking Books staff selects books for you (Auto Select). Your request list is depleted, and the computer is not able to pick any new books. This may be a result of your reading interests being out of date, or you may have read everything available. You may want to contact Talking Books and add to the list of reading interests you originally requested.

You Changed Your Address and Did Not Tell Us

Be sure to keep Talking Books up to date with your address changes. Talking Books may be sending books to the wrong address.

Your Service Has Been Suspended

Talking Books may have received something in the mail that suggests that you are no longer interested in the Talking Books service. For example, did you write "send no more" on a returned mail card? This could have been interpreted as "cancel my service." You may have received a third notice on an overdue book, and your service has been put on hold. If you are concerned that your service might have been suspended, please contact Talking Books.

REQUESTING BOOKS

Your book orders are very important to us at the Talking Book Library. Our goal is to send out the books you order as quickly as we possibly can. If you place your book order with us today, your books will go out the next working day, provided there are copies of the titles you requested on the shelf. Just like a print library, we only have a certain number of copies of each title on the shelf. If all copies of a title you have requested are checked out, that title will go out to you as soon as a copy becomes available.

Sometimes there may be a waiting list for the more popular titles. Requests for any given title are sent out in the order in which they are received. Once the books leave the Talking Book Library, we cannot guarantee how quickly you will receive them. Delivery of the books depends on the punctuality of the U.S. Mail service.

CALLING ALL LOST CARTRIDGES

Talking Books is receiving a large number of returned boxes from patrons with the cartridge missing from the box. Please remember to always double check and make sure the book cartridge is in its container before mailing the container back. Not only does this help Talking Books, it helps you get the next book faster. If you find a book cartridge that is missing its box, please call Talking Books and we will send a retrieval box for you to return the cartridge. Thanks!

LIMITS TO BARD MOBILE DOWNLOADS

BARD download allows you to download to the BARD Mobile app, be it an iPhone, iPad or iPod Touch. To listen to one of our books on your iOS mobile device, you need to have two pieces of software. The first is a downloaded book and the second is a read authorization object file. The read authorization object is a security file that gives you permission to listen to the book you have downloaded.

In order to protect downloaded books from unauthorized distribution, the BARD server will only issue 100 read authorizations to any one BARD Mobile patron in any 30-day period. If you exceed this limit, you'll get a message that says "you are not authorized to read this book." Currently the only cure for this block is to wait until the next day in hopes that your rolling 30-day total of titles requested will drop back below 100.

This limit does not apply to the number of books you download on your personal computer and listen to them on your digital talking book machine; only the number of books you listen to on your mobile device.

SAVE THE PACKAGING

Please do not discard the box or packaging materials for your talking book player. If you need to send your player back, please send it back using those original materials.

BATTERY INFORMATION

Patrons nationwide are experiencing diminished battery capacity on their digital talking book machines, but do not be alarmed if you notice your machine holds less of a charge than it used to hold. Some players announce they have up to 29 hours of charge remaining, but be aware the number of hours remaining can vary from machine to machine and will inevitably decrease over time.

According to the NLS, if your player reads for 12 hours or more, the machine is in good working order and there is no need to replace it. Charging time can drop dramatically from one usage to the next, especially if you have been using a flash drive instead of a cartridge. Here are some tips for managing your machine battery:

- When listening to your digital machine at home, keep it plugged in. This will help preserve the battery life.
- When recharging, make sure it has fully recharged before unplugging it. It is fine to let the battery run down to zero; in fact, the battery will not recharge until it is less than ¼ charged. You will know the battery is fully charged when the player says, "greater than x number of hours."
- Even when the battery will not charge at all, it will still play for a long period of time.
- If you are not going to use your player for a long period of time, please make sure it is plugged in to prevent battery damage.
- If the battery will not charge at all, please let us know and we will send out a player with a fresh battery as soon as possible.

When sending in a book order, please remember to put your name on the order form. We have received orders without a name on the order form and envelope, when this happens, we cannot fulfill that request.

VOLUNTEER ICE CREAM SUNDAE SOCIAL

CASSETTE SERVICE WILL END AUGUST 1ST

As many of you know the National Library Service ceased production and maintenance of cassette books and the cassette players in 2010. For the last four years, Talking Books has been able to continue cassette service, but the time has come to phase cassettes out. Therefore, cassette service for all patrons will end August 1st. Patrons must return their cassette books and players at that time. The National Library Service requires NDSL to return all cassettes and equipment. Talking Books cannot allow you to keep them, nor will they be for sale.

A majority of patrons have already cancelled their cassette service and are pleased with the wide selection of digital books. Talking Books is continuing to add new digital titles on a regular basis.

RETURNING MAGAZINES IN A TIMELY MANNER

If you are a patron who subscribes to magazines, we would like to offer a helpful hint. Many magazines are time sensitive, and in order to stay current you should listen to your magazines as soon as you receive them. You will not receive the next issue of any magazine until you have returned the issue that you currently have in your possession. If you do not return your magazines in a timely manner, before long you will be behind on the current magazine issues. Remember, listen to magazines as soon as you receive them, and then put them back in the mail so you receive the next issue.

MULTIPLE MAGAZINES ON A CARTRIDGE

For those patrons who subscribe to several magazines you may find multiple titles on a cartridge. To jump from one title to another you can use the player's bookshelf feature. Simply press and hold the green PLAY/STOP button until the player beeps and says, "Bookshelf," then use the fast forward or rewind buttons to toggle through the magazine titles. Once you hear the title you want, press the PLAY/STOP button again.

LARGE PRINT BOOKS AVAILABLE

Talking Books are not the only books patrons of the North Dakota State Library Talking Books program receive from us. We also have a substantial selection of Large Print books (over 10,000!) available. Qualifying individuals with a visual or physical impairment that are able to read large print can receive large print books from the State Library. These books go out "Free Matter for the Blind" so there are no postage charges for receiving or returning large print books.
