### The 1989 Legislative Session: library issues examined

The 1989 North Dakota Legislative Assembly began January 4, 1989 in Bismarck. The following is a summary of those legislative bills currently of interest to the State Library and to the library community. (The following information is current as of February 9, 1989.)

HB 1007: State Library appropriation bill. The first hearing for the 1989-1991 State Library appropriation was on Friday, January 13, 1989, in the Government Operations Subcommittee of the House Appropriation Committee. In presenting testimony, Patricia Harris, State Librarian, addressed the concerns of the \$214,000 reduction in operating expenses for the 1989-1991 biennium. A reduction of this magnitude in operating expenses will require major reductions in the services the State Library provides. No action from the subcommittee has been taken.

HB 1229: This bill proposes to abolish the Director of Institutions office and place the various agencies under DOI in other existing agencies. The State Penitentiary, Rough Riders Industries, and the State Industrial School would be moved to the Department of Human Services. The School for the Deaf, School for the Blind, and the State Library would be transferred to the Department of Public Instruction. State Radio would be moved to the Attorney General's Office, and responsibility for the Capitol building and grounds moved to the Office of Management and Budget.

In presenting testimony against the move of the State Library to the Department of Public Instruction, Harris addressed the House State and Federal Government Committee. Committee members were urged not to confuse the mission of the State Library, which is providing information and access to information to libraries and to the citizens of North Dakota; and providing for the development of public libraries in the State with the Department of Public Instruction's mission of providing direct education to school age children.

SB 2026: The State Library's 1989 deficiency payment of \$32,475 is included in this bill. The deficiency payment is needed to remain qualified for 1989 federal funds.

SB 2084: This bill relates to the limits on terms of office for members of the board of directors of a public library. It allows public library board members to serve an unlimited number of terms. This bill received a do not pass recommendation from the Senate Education Committee and was defeated in the Senate.

HCR 3045: A concurrent resolution urging the Governor of North Dakota to declare 1989 as the Year of the Young Reader.

### North Dakota State Library Celebrates Government Week

The North Dakota State Library announced a series of special Centennial Events for the public. The activities will mark Government Week, February 21-24, at the State Library.

Activities include: a variety of tours highlighting the special collections and personnel of the library (Tuesday through Friday); demonstrations of Easylink, Infomaster, and statewide online library catalog software (Thursday and Friday).

A "Meet the North Dakota Writers" day is planned on Wednesday, February 22nd. Sessions will be held from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon and from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m. A special "Brown Bag Lunch" in honor of the participating authors is scheduled from noon until 1:00 p.m. on that day. The Centennial Poet for North Dakota will also be announced during the activities. For information on the tours or the "Meet the North Dakota Writers" programs, call the State Library at 224-2490. ### LEGISLATIVE BILL STATUS? ASK YOUR LIBRARIAN

With the North Dakota Legislature in full swing, the North Dakota State Library is offering once again to search online Bill Status for citizens from rural areas who do not have ready access to the online Bill Status information. Computerized information for both houses on individual bills--including old and new text, bills listed by subject, daily journal actions, committee hearing dates and times, prime bill sponsors, Century Code conflicts, bill activity by date, and summary voting statistics for the session--is available through the system. To research a bill or to check on the work of a local legislator, citizens may simply call the North Dakota State Library Reference Department at 224-4622 and request a search. Having the number of the desired bill speeds up the search. All searches are performed free of charge.

Once an agency has been completed, new items will be fiched and cataloged upon receipt. ### **NEH Seeks Humanities Projects in Libraries**

Humanities Projects in Libraries and Archives invites proposals to plan or to present public humanities programs.

Applications for planning awards should include: a clearly defined topic or thesis, a list of scholars to be involved in the project, and a plan of work describing preparations and intended results. Planning grants provide support for up to six months. Deadlines for application are in May and August, 1989.

Implementation awards are made for periods of one to three years. Proposals for implementation must also include a clearly defined topic and demonstrate how scholarship in the humanities will reach a general audience. Deadlines for application are March 17 and September 15, 1989.

All proposed projects must demonstrate active collaboration between humanities scholars and librarians and archivists.

### STATEWIDE LIBRARY AUTOMATION PROJECT RECEIVES FEDERAL GRANT

The U.S. Department of Education has awarded \$110,000 in Higher Education Act Title II-D "joint-use" funding to LEND (Library Excellence for North Dakota) a consortium of North Dakota resource libraries. Funding will assist with implementation of Phase I of statewide library automation, beginning in North Dakota's Higher Education Libraries and the State Library. The grant will be administered for the group by Bismarck State College. According to grant Project Director Val Morehouse of the North Dakota State Library, the main computer will be housed in the Computer Center at the University of North Dakota. The system will be the Unisys PALS.

The U.S. Department of Education grant will speed up implementation of a shared public online catalog of library holdings on computer. This database will be accessible by telephone statewide for any citizen (or library) with a microcomputer and modem.

Project personnel expect the statewide online library catalog, which features state-of-the-art search capability, to be available for demonstrations in March or April, with full operational status beginning in Grand Forks at the University libraries and at Grand Forks Public Library by the end of the year. Live demonstrations of the online catalog software are planned for Government Week, February 21-24, at the North Dakota State Library in Bismarck. The public is invited. Contact the North Dakota State Library for a demonstration schedule.

### CENET ON EASYLINK.

In response to budget cuts that preclude publication, the North Dakota State Library has begun an EASYLINK version of CENET. This lists continuing education workshops and conferences of interest to North Dakota Librarians and Library Trustees. EASYLINK users can access the publication from the electronic mail system at the PTS prompt by typing:

#### /EXIT FYI < cr >

When < cr > is the "enter" key on your library microcomputer. FYI will respond:

### ENTER YOUR CATEGORY

At that point you may prepare to download CENET by activating your communications software to save the incoming file to disk, or to route the file to the printer. To start the downloading, you should type:

# Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries Recommends 1989 L.S.C.A. Grants

The Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries met to discuss 1989 Library Services and Construction Act (L.S.C.A.) grant applications on May 8-9, 1989. This annual session allows the Advisory Council to provide advice to the State Librarian on the distribution of federal L.S.C.A. funds for institutional, public, and cooperative library projects.

Institutional grants awarded included: \$3,000 to the Grafton State School for acquisition of equipment to enhance the client library; \$5,000 to the North Dakota State Hospital in Jamestown for collection development in the patient libraries; \$4,100 to the North Dakota School for the Blind in Grand Forks to acquire low vision aids for library use; \$7,900 to the North Dakota School for the Deaf in Devils Lake for collection development; and \$5,000 to the North Dakota State Industrial School in Mandan for development of an instructional video library. Total funds awarded in this category: \$25,000.

Grants for the development and improvement of public library services (L.S.C.A. Title I) included: \$3,500 for computer acquisition and Easylink access to four public libraries: Beulah Public Library, Clara Lincoln Phelan Public Library in Bowman, Lisbon Public Library, and Mayville Public Library; \$9,251 to Dakota Radio Information Service to fund the Coordinator of Volunteers position for one year; \$1,559 to the Grand Forks Public Library to acquire an Apple computer that can be adapted for use of handicapped individuals. A Title I grant of \$22,290 was also given to the Fargo Public Library for the development and promotion of a statewide toll-free reference service available in the evenings to all North Dakota citizens. Total Title I grants awarded were \$47,100.

L.S.C.A. Title II grants for library construction, acquisition, remodeling, or renovation were also awarded at the May meeting. Recipients were: Bottineau County Library - \$112,000 for new construction; Cavalier Public Library - \$700 for remodeling; Edna Ralston Library (Larimore) - \$11,000 for remodeling of a new facility; Grand Forks Public Library - \$31,154 to remodel roof for energy efficiency; Harvey Public Library - \$18,000 to supplement a previous grant for new construction; New England Public Library - \$8,500 for acquisition of a new facility; and Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library - \$113,154 for alteration and completion of meeting rooms. A total of \$294,508 in new and reverted L.S.C.A. Title II funds was awarded.

Title III grants to foster interlibrary cooperation and resource sharing were awarded to four recipients: \$8,494 to the Divide County Public Library for automation of the joint elementary school/public library in Crosby; \$4,400 to the Ellendale Public Library for a computer to improve interlibrary cooperation in the area; \$3,500 to the New England Public Library for computer acquisition for Easylink access for all libraries in New England; and \$8,728 to the Harley E. French Library of the Health Sciences for acquisition of six fax machines to be placed in selected public, academic, and special libraries. \$25,123 in Title III funds were awarded.

### **New Publications from National Library Service**

National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped has issued two new publications which are available free from the State Library.

Bibles, Other Scriptures, Liturgies, and Hymnals in Special Media is a reference circular which lists sacred texts of many of the world's religions that have been prepared in alternatives to conventional print. Commentaries, concordances, prayer books, and hymnals are also included in this publication.

Fishing: An Introduction to Fishing for Fun and Food for Blind and Physically Handicapped Individuals, the second in a series of leisure activity booklets, provides a selected list of recorded and braille books and magazines about fishing. It tells of the experience of a blind fisherman and explains how a licensed guide assists young blind people in learning the techniques of fishing.

According to NLS Director Frank Kurt Cylke, "The first introductory booklet on leisure pursuits, Birding: An Introduction to Ornithological Delights for Blind and Physically Handicapped Individuals, proved to be one of the most popular new publications ever issued by NLS. Blind and physically handicapped individuals enjoy a wide range of leisure time activities, and these booklets provide general background and sources for more specific information and additional readings."

### Baker & Taylor/JMRT Grassroots Grant Recipient Named

Ann Braaten, an elementary education/library science student at the University of North Dakota, has been named the 1989 recipient of the Baker and Taylor/North Dakota Library Association Junior Members Round Table Grassroots Grant.

The purpose of the grant, which is given by the Baker & Taylor Company, a book vendor, is to encourage the professional development of student librarians and to assist their participation in the activities of statewide library associations. This is done by providing grant recipients with \$250 with which to attend their state library conference.

Ann was selected from a pool of applicants from across the state and will attend the NDLA Fall Conference in Grand Forks.

### Stutsman County Library Receives Video Grant

The Stutsman County Library recently received a collection of video cassettes through the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. The foundation has been assisting libraries in acquiring collections of many of the most noteworthy programs from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

The collection, which is labeled "Series A" for grant purposes includes series such as: The Living Planet; The Constitution: That Delicate Balance; The Shakespeare Plays; The Brain; and the Ascent of Man.

The video collection is available to all Stutsman County residents and may be available, for a nominal charge, to other users. The video collection includes public performance rights for inlibrary and community group screenings.

### 1989 Legislative Session: A final wrap-up

The Centennial Legislative Session, which began on January 4, 1989, came to a close on April 20, 1989. It was a long and difficult session for the Legislators. They had to deal with the effects of the 1988 drought, declining energy revenues, and proposals intended to increase state revenues. The North Dakota library community continued to provide excellent support for the State Library and for library issues facing the legislature. The following is a summary of legislative activity fecting the State Library and the North Dakota library community.

HB1007: State Library Appropriation Bill. The 1989-1991 budget for the State Library was approved at 9:00 p.m. on April 19, 1989. The final budget included an additional \$30,000 in operating expenses and an additional \$40,000 for State Aid to Public Libraries. Two new staff positions were approved and will increase the full-time equivalent staff to 24.5 staff positions. Though the operating expenses for the State Library were increased slightly over the Governor's original budget recommendation, the State Library must reduce operating expenses by 18.6% for the next two years. State Aid to Public Libraries will total \$1,000,000 for the 1989-1991 budget.

HB1229: This amended bill will transfer the administrative responsibility of the State Library from the Director of Institutions to the Department of Public Instruction, effective January 1, 1991. The bill provides for the autonomy of the State Library under the Department of Public Instruction and includes the provision that the State Librarian will report directly to the Superintendent of Public Instruction and that the State Library will retain a staff and budget separate from the Department of Public Instruction. Over the next eighteen months, the State Librarian, Director of Institutions, and the Superintendent of Public Instruction will work in cooperation to insure a smooth transfer of the State Library to the Department of Public Instruction.

SB2026: In August, 1988 the State Library received a two percent (2%) budget reduction which placed the State Library below the minimum federally required dollar amount for the maintenance of effort. Through SB2026, State Library received its requested deficiency payment for the 1987-1989 budget to remain qualified for the 1989 federal Library Services and Construction Act funds.

HCR3045: On April 6, 1989, Governor George Sinner signed this bill proclaiming 1989 as the Year of the Young Reader in North Dakota.

The State Library thanks all in the North Dakota Library community who provided assistance during this Legislative session. The hundreds of telephone calls and letters to legislators helped the State Library get approval for its budget and an increase in State Aid.

### NDSL Science Fair Bibliography Updated

The NDSL announces publication of UPDATE 89/SCIENCE FAIR PROJECT BOOKS at the NORTH DAKOTA STATE LIBRARY: AN ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY. This work is a continuation of a special project begun in 1988 at NDSL to enhance the provision of science fair project materials to libraries, schools and students.

Each ERIC citation in RIE includes a price code for microfiche (mf) and paper copy (pc). Shipping charges will be billed at the cost of the method selected. If shipment by other than first class mail or UPS is desired, state method, i.e., Federal Express, UPS Next Day Air or USPS Express Mail.

An additional \$1.00 per document for shipping and handling will be added by the ERIC Document Reproduction Service. The NDSL will add a \$1.00 per document charge for processing the request via the OCLC Interlibrary Loan Subsystem.

The cost of a 25-page document is \$4.00 plus shipping in paper copy and \$2.85 plus shipping in microfiche. Add \$2.00 for each additional 25 pages for paper copies.
