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Historic Achievement

Spring did not come to North Dakota until the North Dakota Legislature completed their work. In so many ways, such was appropriate so that the green of the prairie and the songbirds of the season could not divert attention from the task at hand --- the crafting of a state budget for the next biennium. Upon conclusion of the Legislature's work, historic funding levels and plans were achieved for North Dakota. With the new budget, libraries are also to be part of North Dakota's historic achievement.

Appreciation is expressed to Governor Jack Dalrymple who strongly supported not just libraries but also the mission of libraries as accessible depositories of knowledge, information and personal leisure. The Governor fully endorsed the entire package of suggested budget inclusions as prepared by the State Library in his Executive Budget recommendations. The Legislature, after consideration of the Governor's recommendations, approved level-funding of the State Library's operations. This approval allows for a continuation of programs like database renewal and the statewide Tutor.ND (http://www.tutornd.com/) program as well as services like the Interlibrary Loan (ILL) service that is provided to all types of libraries in the state. Also, the technology grant program of the ND Library Coordinating Council was level-funded in the budget appropriation of the State Library. These are programs and services that not only aid and support public libraries, but also enhance the services of the libraries at North Dakota's public schools and North Dakota's colleges/universities.



The ND House vote to approve the NDSL budget taken at 2:35 AM on the last day of the 63rd Legislative Assembly session.

The Legislature rejected the one-time grant initiative proposed by the State Library that was designed to allow for much needed repairs in public library buildings. However, the Legislature did approve an increase in the funding of state aid to public libraries. Recognition for the fairness of the Legislature's decision process is to be noted in the fact that the State Library was afforded the opportunity to select between the initiative of the building repair program or an increase in state aid funding. It was the view of the State Library that the equity factor of all public libraries benefiting from a state aid increase was a preferred program for funding.

The final result of the concluded 63rd Legislative Assembly is that the funding available in the forthcoming biennium budget for state aid to public libraries shall be \$1,766,500. This represents an 18% increase over the present biennium level and this increase is the largest increase in state aid during one biennium since the inception of the state aid formula (created in 1979). The increase obtained was a group effort of the State Library, the North Dakota Library Association Legislative Committee, and the many librarians in the state who sent emails and made telephone calls to Legislative members. Indeed, a historic achievement!

New News and Thoughts...

The musical group Pink Floyd, in song, said "we don't need no education; we don't need no thought control; (not needed) is no dark sarcasm in the classroom; (because) teachers need to leave them kids alone!"

As another school year draws to a conclusion in North Dakota, all citizens can be happy about the educational success of the state's students. In a state with a top rated high school graduation rate....in a state where parents still care about the education of their children....in a state where students enjoy the competitive nature of the work undertaken to obtain scholarships....and, in a state where tax dollars are willingly expended on the future leaders of the state....the lyrics of Pink Floyd fail to resonate.

The North Dakota State Library (NDSL) is pleased to have been a supporting partner in the educational process of the state's students for the past nine months. As a partner, NDSL has provided the following assistance.

- Reference Services. NDSL is a backup Reference Center for many schools via the loan of reference materials directly to public schools across the state. The direct loan of reference and research documents to students is also available. Noteworthy is the fact that approximately 1/5 of the reference service rendered by NDSL is directly related to school age, K-12, library users.
- Databases. The collection of databases provided in a statewide network, directly aid the educational processes in the state with concise, authoritative, and knowledgeable information. This service was enhanced this past year with the addition of the Credo reference materials collection and complimented by the Literati search function --- a feature as easy to use as a Google/Bing search but with far superior results.
- Interlibrary Loan (ILL). ¼ of the ILL requests processed by NDSL are for school students. The materials requested may be sent to the student's school library or to the student directly if they have a library card from the state library. Enhancing the availability of materials, NDSL also underwrites costs incurred to access, per need, the collections of Minnesota libraries.
- Talking Books. Students with learning disabilities may receive books in a digital format to aid their education. NDSL also offers aid to special education teachers to acquaint the teachers with this service.
- Tutoring. Changing the B+ student into an A student and changing the scholarship finalist designation into the scholarship winner announcement ---- such has been the result for the North Dakota's students that use the free statewide tutoring service provided by NDSL. Available each evening, Sunday through Thursday, across the state, this service connects the student with retired professors giving instructional help in their subject specialty.
- Trainings. NDSL designs a segment of the annual "Spring Workshop" series and the annual "Summer Breeze" training to accommodate teachers and advance their knowledge of new trends and current topics such as the topic of "Bullying" which was discussed by featured educators this past April.
- Grants. Working within the expanded guidelines of the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council, public schools can apply for grants. Such grants have increased the technology and the programming capabilities of ND schools.

So, while the lyrics of Alice Cooper's song announces that "school's out for the summer!" and such may be accurate, the North Dakota State Library contends that the thoughts of the group Pink Floyd are just not on target for North Dakota. And, the whole state is proud of this fact.

Summer Breeze 2013 - Strategic Planning Colloquium

Digital Public Library of America Update

After much talk and extensive planning, the Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) launched in the month of April. This collection of material is, in reality, a next step in information preservation --- a step going beyond the role of the Library of Congress. It should be remembered that the mission of the Library of Congress is first and foremost to serve the research needs of the U.S. Congress rather than the needs of the national populace.

The Digital Public Library is a 3-layer project. The layer that shall be the most familiar is the DPLA website with search functions (see: http://dp.la). To make everything work there is a layer that involves the technical infrastructure that is in an open source format so that others, especially libraries, can build on top of the base of DPLA. The final layer is the many partnerships that pairs the DPLA project with libraries, museums, archives, universities/schools, and other institutions, to advance the mission of libraries to in provide access to information. In its inaugural format, DPLA is primarily a metadata repository that pulls open data from cultural heritage collections at multiple institutions and centralizes the data. As stated in their mission, "The DPLA is a first step toward the realization of a large-scale digital public library that will make cultural and scientific records available to all."

The DPLA has, in large part, been built on the work of other digital projects like HathiTrust, Internet Archive, and Europeana. The focus on cultural heritage collections, an early example of which can be seen in Leaving Europe (see: http://exhibitions.europeana.eu/exhibits/show/europe-america-en), allows DPLA to begin quickly with content that is already easily accessible. In its beginning, strong efforts have been made to combine a group of rich, interesting digital collections, from state and regional digital archives to the special collections of major university libraries and federal holdings.
