

The Library: All Travelers Welcome The 2013 Tri-Conference

Another year of the annual conference has come and gone. This year the North Dakota Library Association (NDLA), the South Dakota Library Association (SDLA) and the Mountain Plains Library Association (MPLA) came together to collaborate and celebrate our common thread, our love of libraries.

The conference was scheduled down to the last minute with keynote speakers, poster sessions, exhibits, meetings, trainings and so much more! On the next two



After attending NDLA for 5 years, this year I attended my first pre-conference session, Story Time Slime, and it was well worth it! Hosted by Julie Gintzler of Steve Spangler Science, Story Time Slime focused on STEM activities you can do in the library to get kids excited about science while connecting the discoveries made to books. When I signed up for the session, I knew it was about STEM programming, but I didn't realize it was hands-on! Every participant received a box of supplies so we could conduct several experiments. Throughout the day, Julie walked us through the experiments, the science behind them and the K-4 Grade National Science Education Content Standard to which they correlate, and the books she uses to connect the science to stories with which young children can identify. Instead of using non-fiction books, to which young children may not have a connection, she uses fiction books where the characters have experiences with which a young child would be familiar. In addition to supplies, our kits contained a resource guide with all the experiments and documentation for conducting the experiments in the library. It was an inspiring session that provided excellent ideas to implement at your library! The North Dakota State Library (NDSL) is pleased to introduce a new circulating kit, The Wii Gaming Kit, available to public libraries. The Wii Gaming Kit will be loaned to your library, free of charge, for a four-week period. During the loan period, library staff members can set up the gaming system for patrons to come in and play.

The systems include 6 games (Super Smash Brothers, Minute To Win It, Wii Sports, Wii Sports Resort, Mario Kart, and Just Dance), four remotes, and two nunchucks. The systems must be kept at the library at all times. The program will run similar to the Tech Tools Kits.

The games included with the system are for anyone over the age of four. Libraries around the country that have been trying video games in the library have been having great success. Because the target age range is so vast with these systems, libraries can get almost anyone coming in to try these games out. They are also very popular with teens, which is an area a lot of libraries have been working on.

On the www.library.nd.gov/marketing.html website there is the official lending policy handout and marketing materials. Any library participating in this program is welcome to utilize these marketing materials. On the website you will find editable PDF versions of flyers, invitations and Facebook ads.

Contact your Field Services Representative to schedule your Wii Gaming kit loan. Kits can be sent via mail; but when possible a NDSL staff member will deliver and pick up the kits in person at the beginning and end of your four-week loan period. Wii look forward to invading your library soon!

Geek the Library

Geek the Library is a community awareness campaign aimed at building support for libraries. This is a nationwide campaign funded by a grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. This means all the materials and support you receive from Geek the Library is FREE! They will provide any participating library field support and initital campaign materials, such as posters, stickers and bookmarks, and access to a campaign management center. Using this online resource, library staff can download hundreds of art files and helpful documents, find detailed guidance for every phase of the campaign and share ideas.

The idea behind the campaign, is that everyone "Geeks," or is passionate about, something - and public libraries support them all. The campaign message is bold and simple, and it focuses on the critical role that public libraries play in local communities while raising awareness for local library funding challenges.

We understand that many libraries out there are understaffed and underfunded, but the NDSL is here to help and guide you along the way.

The North Dakota State Library is going to launch a state wide Geek the Library initiative this spring. We suggest any library interested in getting your community excited about the library contact their Field Services Representative.

If this program at all is interesting to you, Geek the Library is putting together an informational webinar specifically for our state. Your Field Services Representative will be sending the webinar out once we receive it. Geek the Library will also be present at our spring workshops to help and guide your library in any way they can!

Lady Almina and the real Downton Abbey: the lost legacy of Highclere Castle

By the Countess of Carnarvon

Tells the story behind Highclere Castle, the real-life inspiration and setting for Julian Fellowes's Emmy Award-winning PBS show, and the life of one of its most famous inhabitants, Lady Almina, the 5th Countess of Carnarvon. But with the unexpected return of Claude, Edgar's paternal uncle, turmoil consumes the Sawtelles' once peaceful home. When Edgar's father dies suddenly, Claude insinuates himself into the life of the farm -- and into Edgar's mother's affections. Grief-stricken and bewildered, Edgar tries to prove Claude played a role in his father's death, but his plan backfires -- spectacularly. Forced to flee into the vast wilderness lying beyond the farm, Edgar comes of age in the wild, fighting for his survival and that of the three yearling dogs who follow him. But his need to face his father's murderer and his devotion to the Sawtelle dogs turn Edgar ever homeward.

Presents are being wrapped and reservations made when Nick's clever and beautiful wife disappears from their rented McMansion on the Mississippi River. Husband-of-the-year Nick isn't doing himself any favors with cringe-worthy daydreams about the slope and shape of his wife's head, but passages from Amy's diary reveal the alpha-girl perfectionist could have put anyone dangerously on edge. Under mounting pressure from police and the media -- as well as Amy's fiercely doting parents -- the town golden boy parades an endless series of lies, deceits, and inappropriate behavior. Nick is oddly evasive, and he's definitely bitter -- but is he really a killer? As the cops close in, every couple in town is soon wondering how well they really know the one they love.

Audiobooks Available For Book Club Kits

The State Library has recently extended the options for users of their popular new book club kits. Audiobook editions of the following kit titles are now available: The Fault in Our Stars, Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet, Home Front, The Night Circus, The Round House, The Storyteller, and Thirteen Reasons Why.

Many of these titles are not currently available from the publisher in a large print edition, so audio is another way to broaden the number of patrons who can participate. Audiobooks are not automatically included in the kits; they must be checked out separately, either by the library or by the patron. They are in general circulation, so they are not guaranteed to be immediately available.

E-rate: Let's Get Started!

In my last article, I introduced some of the basics of E-rate. In this article, I will describe the beginning phase of the process. First, you need to determine if you are eligible. Ask yourself these two questions. Are you a public library that receives state aid from the North Dakota State Library? Are you considered a not-for-profit entity and have a budget that is separate from any school district or institute of higher learning? If the answer to the two questions is yes, then you qualify for participating in E-rate.

Next, we need to examine what is considered an eligible service by reviewing the five categories on the Eligible Service List; Telecommunication Services (Priority One), Internet Access (Priority One), Internal Connections (Priority Two), Basic Maintenance (Priority Two), and Miscellaneous. Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) will fund Priority One categories first, and then fund Priority Two. You can find the eligible service list on the USAC website, http://bit.ly/16PTuCV.

After you have determined what services and products you are seeking discounts for, you need to determine if you need to write a technology plan. Technology Plans are NO LONGER required for Priority One Services but Technology Plans are still required for Priority Two Services. They have dropped the budget section requirement from the technology plan. There are only four elements rather than five.

- 1. The plan must establish clear goals and a realistic strategy for using telecommunications and information technology to improve education or library services;
- 2. The plan must have a professional development strategy to ensure that staff know how to use these new technologies to improve education or library services;
- 3. The plan must include an assessment of the telecommunication services, hardware, software, and other services that will be needed to improve education or library services; and
- 4. The plan must include an evaluation process that enables the school or library to monitor progress toward the specified goals and make mid-course corrections in response to new developments and opportunities as they arise.

Once you have determined your eligibility status, which services you will apply for and whether you need a tech plan drawn up, you can now move to the first form necessary for the E-rate process, the Form 470, Description of Services Requested and Certification Form). A Form 470 opens competitive bidding for vendors. If an RFP (request for proposal) is necessary, you can issue this document at the same time. Check with your local government to inquire whether or not you need an RFP. Once the Form 470 is filed, it will be uploaded to USAC's website for review. The Form 470 allows vendors to review the services requested and bid on providing those services. Bids must remain open for at least 28 days in order to ensure a fair and open bidding process. After the 28th day, you can enter into contract negotiations with vendors, BUT YOU MUST WAIT THE 28 DAYS BEFORE SPEAKING TO A VENDOR!

You can file your Form 470 either on paper by mail or electronically. You can find the Form 470 as well as all the other forms needed for the E-rate process, online by clicking this link, http://bit.ly/1bF67Cm. When applying online, it would be a good habit to write down the application number or print out the page that provides the number and store it in your 2014-2015 E-rate folder. I would suggest creating a folder to hold all of your E-rate correspondences and copies of forms, matrixes, etc, for each year. That way, paperwork doesn't get lost or mixed up with other years.

One thing to keep in mind while filling out the form, when you are seeking out bids for discounts for services, it is helpful to vendors if you include the details. For example, if you are seeking discounts on two separate telephone lines, then state "2 telephone lines." If you are seeking Internet service at a particular speed, then state it in your request.

Once posted, you will receive an FCC Form 470 Receipt Notification Letter acknowledging that USAC has received your application. The Receipt Notification Letter will provide you with the Allowable Contract Date, which is the last day of the 28 day waiting period.

So, this is how we start the E-rate process. Go forth and apply. If you have any questions about E-rate, feel free to contact me at 701-328-4021 or alpeterson@nd.gov.




State Park Passes Are Coming to all North Dakota Public Library's

Introducing Primo, the New Online Catalog of the State Library

Starting October 21st, the search box on our website will direct all catalog searches to Primo (a discovery solution from Ex Libris). This is an exciting change that will make it easier for our patrons to tap into article content from our subscription databases. While the catalog looks a bit different, not much will change in terms of our interaction with it. Search is intuitive and results are snappily delivered.



You will still be able to refine your search using the facets along the left-hand side of your results list—things like topic, author, publication date, language, and collection. Results lists can be sorted by relevance, date, author, or title.

You can request items directly from the results list by clicking Request (you may have to sign in first, of course), saving you the step of clicking through to the bibliographic record first.




There are four search categories above the search box: Books, Articles and More searches items in our collection as well as our online resources; North Dakota State Library Catalog just searches our collection; Articles+ solely searches our online resources; All ODIN Libraries searches for items held by any library that's part of the ODIN library consortium.

All libraries in the ODIN consortium will be changing over to Primo at some point in the not-too-distant future, and a few already have. If you'd like to get a sneak peek at how Primo will work for the State Library, simply head to: http://odinlibrary.org/primo-nds.html.

North Dakota Tidbits

- The Mayville Public Library was bequeathed \$50,000 by the late Ethel Hoff. Margaret Rice, library director, said the money will go towards building restoration and upkeep.
- Hettinger High School Classes of 1953, 1954, 1955, and 1956 jointly presented Hettinger High School librarian LeNae Kristy with a donation of \$950 for the library.
- The Fort Berthold Community College Education Program recently received 864 books from the Reader to Reader organization's Literacy Program. The books will be distributed to community schools, the College's Adult Education program, and its Elementary Education program.
- A recently concluded survey revealed that Grand Forks residents favor building a new public library over remodeling the current facility, with 43% of respondents strongly agreeing with the new construction.
- The James River Valley Library System Library Board wants to create a joint powers agreement between itself, the Stutsman County Commission and the Jamestown City Council so that it can put building a new library to a public vote. Everyone in Stutsman County would then be able to vote on whether to approve a county-wide quarter-cent sales tax to pay for the new library.
- The James River Valley Library System Library Board voted to hire a financial adviser to help put together a U.S. Department of Agriculture loan application, which would be used to pay for the new library and which would be paid back with the quarter-cent sales tax.
- The South Central Area Library (Edgeley) has secured a 99-year lease from the city of Edgeley for a lot adjacent to the library, on which they'll be building a new garage for their bookmobile.
- The Carnegie Regional Library (Grafton) has been aggressively weeding its collection. They hope to receive a grant from the ND Library Coordinating Council to participate in the Statewide Online Catalog through WorldCat..The library is also planning to join the ODIN consortium if they receive the grant, migrating from Winnebago to the ALEPH automation system in the process.

Use of Small and Rural Libraries Grows in the Digital Age

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) recently released a report on the agency's first targeted analysis of trends for rural and small library services. The report gives an overview of the distribution, service use, fiscal health, and staffing of these important community assets.

The brief's key findings include the following:

- Of the 8,956 public libraries in the US in FY2011, 77.1% can be categorized as small. Almost half of all public libraries, 46.8%, were rural libraries.
- In FY2011, there were 167.6 million recorded visits to rural public libraries, a number that has increased by 4.2% over the past three years, and there were 301.2 million visits to small public libraries in FY2011, a three-year increase of 4.6%.

IMLS / Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Partnership

Recently, the American Library Association, the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), have formed a partnership to learn what librarians can do to help patron requests for assistance in navigating health insurance options in the Health Insurance Marketplace. The Marketplace website, HealthCare.gov will be the primary tool for delivering information to Americans about their health coverage options. As prominent providers of Internet access and digital literacy training for people who lack Internet connections at home, libraries can anticipate intensified demand for computer services. IMLS and CMS will work cooperatively to make sure that libraries are aware of and able to connect patrons with information resources and community partners who are trained enrollment assistors.

To support the partnership formed, IMLS has also awarded \$286,104 to OCLC to facilitate efforts through its flagship public library program WebJunction.org. The goal is to assure that librarians have the information and connections with local experts needed to connect their patrons to information about the Health Insurance Marketplace when open enrollment began October 1, 2013. OCLC will work closely with ZeroDivide, a social impact organization that helps underserved communities realize the transformative power of technology to improve health outcomes, to implement the program.

When you use the Health Insurance Marketplace, you'll fill out an application and find out if you can get lower costs on your monthly premiums for private insurance plans. You'll find out if you qualify for lower out-of-pocket costs. The Marketplace will also tell you if you qualify for free or low-cost coverage available through Medicaid or the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Open enrollment started October 1, 2013.
