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State Library Joins OverDrive Consortium

As you are hopefully aware, the company that owns Recorded Books purchased OverDrive last year. The two companies are merging, and RBDigital will be eliminated. The State Library is pleased to be joining the Library2Go OverDrive consortium. All e-book and e-audio titles that are in our collection will be added to the OverDrive collection on December 17th. Magazines will be transferred in either January or February 2021. We will have access to a much larger collection of magazines, and limits that we had on the prior collection will be removed.

OverDrive is making some positive changes to the pricing structure for libraries that belong to the consortium. The fees for being a member are below. I have included the current price and the new price that will be effective on July 1, 2021. Libraries that join the consortium now as new members will not be billed until the contract is renewed in July. Public Library Specialist Abby Ebach will be reaching out to public libraries that are not currently a member of OverDrive to answer questions and provide the paperwork that will need to be completed to join the consortium. One thing to note that is different between how RBDigital functioned and how OverDrive will function is that patrons of public libraries that are not a member of the consortium will have to get a State Library Card to access the e-materials. Local public library cards from member libraries will be able to access the resources directly with their card.



The fee structure as of July 1, 2021, is as follows and is based on the population served.

The Star award is an annual award given out to North Dakota libraries in recognition of the administrators and staff that provide exceptional service to communities of all sizes. Libraries are divided into tiers based on their operating expenditures, and the top 3 libraries in each tier have performed the highest on a number of metrics amongst their peers. The metrics that are considered for the Star awards are total circulation per capita, central branch service hours per week, program attendance per capita, and combined computer and WIFI use per capita.



The Wheelie award highlights the bookmobile that excels in the following areas: total circulation per capita, number of stops, and miles traveled.
