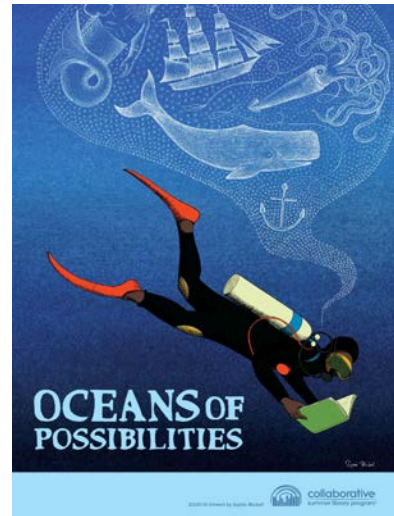

Problems using Libby on iOS 9 and older web browsers

As of October 2021, Libby is no longer supported on iPhones and iPads running iOS 9. This is because of a recent change made by Libby's web certificate provider ([learn more about their change](#)).

This change may also affect those trying to use libbyapp.com in older web browsers.

Affected users may see security warnings in Libby or have trouble using some or all of Libby's features, including signing in, browsing, borrowing, or loading content.

To continue using Libby:

- iPhone/iPad users: **Update your device to iOS 10 (or higher)**.
- Browser users: Update your browser version.

American Rescue Plan: Humanities Grants for Libraries

ALA invites libraries to apply for funding through its [American Rescue Plan: Humanities Grants for Libraries](#) opportunity, a grantmaking program to deliver relief to libraries recovering from the coronavirus pandemic.

With funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, ALA will distribute \$2 million to help anchor libraries as strong humanities institutions as they emerge and rebuild from the coronavirus pandemic. The purpose of this emergency relief program is to assist libraries that have been adversely affected by the pandemic and require support to restore and sustain their core activities.

Up to 200 U.S. libraries of all types (e.g., public, tribal, K-12, academic, special, prison) and representing a broad range of communities will receive \$10,000 through a competitive, peer-reviewed application process. [Register for a free webinar to learn about the application.](#)

Selected libraries will receive:

- \$10,000 to support humanities functions of the libraries.
- One print copy of "[Going Virtual: Programs and Insights from a Time of Crisis](#)" by Sarah Ostman for the ALA Public Programs Office (ALA Editions, 2021)
- Online resources and support

The general goals of this ARP opportunity include to help create or preserve jobs; support or maintain general operations; create or sustain humanities programs; and implement new humanities activities or sustain existing activities. Eligible expenses include salary and benefit support for library workers engaged in humanities activities; costs related to in-person or virtual humanities programming, such as book clubs and guest lectures; and marketing and advertising to support library humanities efforts.

North Dakota Today - State Library Services

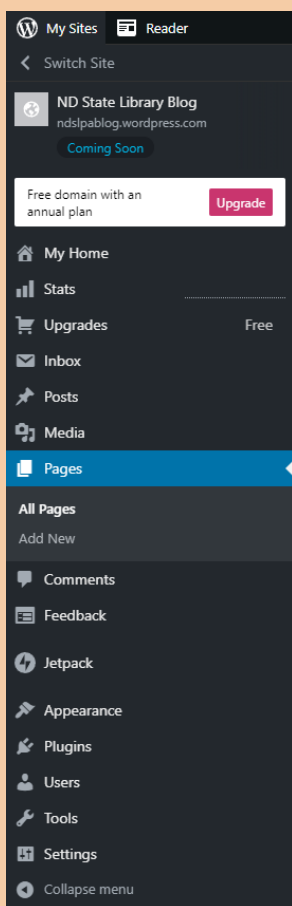
NDSL's Library Services Director Carmen Redding joined North Dakota Today to discuss the services that the State Library offers to North Dakota residents.

WordPress Website Help Creating a New Page



This month, we'll be looking at how to create a new page and how to add it to the menu on your library's WordPress website.

After you have logged in to your [WordPress](#) website, you should see a list that looks similar to the one to the left. Click on or hover over "Pages" and then click on "All Pages" - this will take you to a list of your website pages.

Click on Add new page, which is on the right-hand side. A window will come up giving you options on what your new page can look like. If you want to choose one of those, click on the one you would like and start editing. Otherwise, you can click on the "Blank Page" button on the left-hand side of the screen.

Once your new page is complete, you can click on "Preview" to make sure it looks correct. Then, you can click on "Publish" to make it public. The next time you look at your list of Pages (Pages -> All Pages), you should see your new page on there.

If you would like to include the new page on your website's menu bar, click on or hover over "Appearance" and then click on "Customize." From here, you can click on "Menus" and then "Main Menu" to get to your list of menu items. Click on the "Add Items" button and click on the plus sign next to your new page. You can move the pages on the list to put them in the order you would like them. Once you are happy with how it looks, click "Save" to finish.

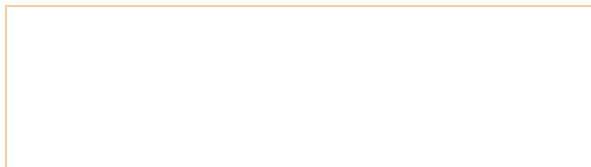
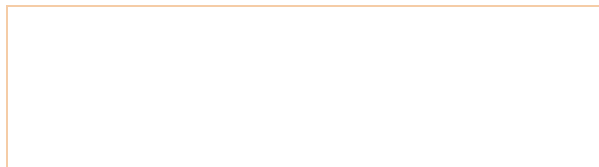
