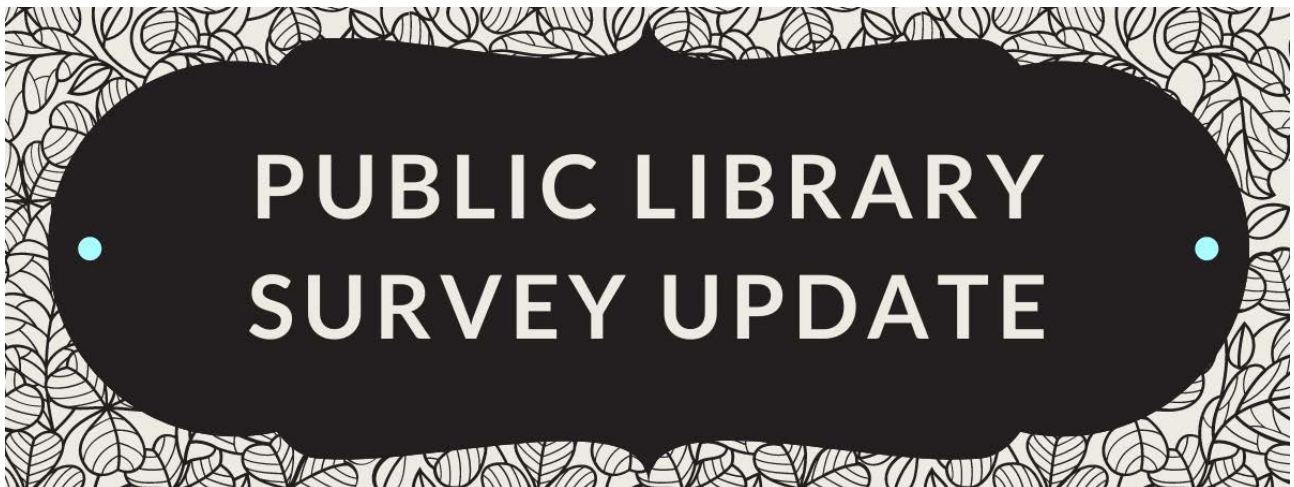

Coordinating Council Nominations Sought

The ND Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) serves as the State Library's advisory board. The NDLCC assists with the creation and implementation of the Library Vision strategic plan, the grants, and serves as the external database review committee. The Governor appoints NDLCC members according to Century Code. Due to a vacancy, we are seeking nominations for the Special Populations seat. The person that is appointed by the Governor will serve the remainder of this term which is through 06/30/24. The Special Populations seat must be filled by a librarian or library staff working in a North Dakota Library and represent disabled, economically disadvantaged, and minority populations.

Nominations, including self-nominations, may be sent to the NDSL Administrative email at ndsladm@nd.gov by December 17. The State Library will compile the list of applicants and forward it to the Governor's office. Nominees will also need to complete an application, which can be found at <https://apps.nd.gov/gov/boards/Application/PersonalInfo>.

Reporting Virtual Programs on the 2021 Public Libraries Survey

As promised last week, here is additional detail on the new questions about virtual programs and their attendance. There are a total of four questions. Anything in quotes is taken directly from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

1. Number of Live Virtual Program Sessions

"A live virtual program session is any planned event that is streamed virtually and can be viewed live as it progresses (i.e., live-streaming.) Include program sessions hosted on Facebook Premiere that are facilitated by a staff member." "Live, virtual programs are conducted via a Web conferencing for Webinar platform such as Facebook, YouTube, or Zoom, during which a library staff member (or other party sponsored by the library) is presenting to or interacting with an audience in real-time." The recording does not need to be made at the library and a sponsored presenter can be dialing in from anywhere. If the program also has an in-person component, only count it under In-Person Sessions; do not also count it here.

2. Live Virtual Program Attendance

"The count of live attendance at virtual program sessions. Count each participant device connected to a virtual program as a single attendee. For program sessions hosted on Facebook Live, YouTube Live, or similar platforms, count peak concurrent viewers. For those hosted on videoconferencing platforms, count the maximum number of non-staff participants during the session." If you are live-streaming a program that also has in-person attendees, count the live-streaming viewers here, even though you do not count the virtual session. If you record and post the program, do not include the views of the recording here.

Community Outreach at Your Library!

Libraries across the country are always looking for new and exciting ways to get the word out about their libraries. One of the best ways to do this is to bring the library to the community instead of waiting for people to come to the building. The [Community Outreach LibGuide](#) looks at different ways libraries can connect with other civic groups, communal living facilities, or even use community space to engage people who might not otherwise come into the library.

Some libraries choose to partner with local parks and swimming pools during the summer months for storytimes or larger family programs like geocaching or passport programs. Others choose to engage their business communities by providing resources at Chamber of Commerce meetings or even partnering with a local Eagles Club to provide library services at some of their events, but the sky is the limit.

Libraries can bring circulation services by materials directly to homebound patrons. Some libraries use bookmobiles or other outreach vehicles to go to other cities in their county to engage those people in library services.

There is no end to the creative ways a library can engage with the community. Look through [this LibGuide](#) to get your wheels spinning, and reach out to your library specialist with questions or if you are in need of support.

Teaching Research Using Primary Sources

Last week, I shared a checklist for creating an inclusive library collection. For Week Three, I will dig into teaching research using primary sources.

Library Journal hosted a seminar titled “Bringing Primary Sources into the Classroom: Empowering Students to Think Critically.” In this webinar, professionals in the fields of teaching and librarianship discussed the importance of using primary sources, particularly in history. To clarify, primary sources are original documents such as photographs, letters, diary entries, poems, interviews, newspaper articles, artwork, cookbooks, etc. (On a side note, unless you have ready access to museums and art galleries, most primary sources used in schools will be digitalized. This is completely ok!)

Studying primary sources allow students to “think like historians.” Primary sources tend to be richer content. They require students to dig deeper and draw conclusions about the time frames, social classes, expectations, and family dynamics. These sources also give a human touch to history, which aids in teaching students empathy. Additionally, primary sources can show students that even **they** are making history every day!

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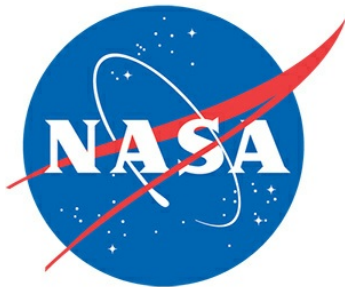
