Battle of the Books

We have had such a great response to starting a Battle of the Books program for North Dakota! This will be a GO for the 2023-2024 school year!

Over the last two weeks, we held several Q&A sessions. I wanted to include some of the questions here for those of you who are maybe on the fence or still thinking about joining.



- 1. What will it cost?** I want this program to be as budget-friendly as possible. My goal is to keep the cost down as much as possible. There is no cost to register or to participate. The only costs you might have is purchasing books from the list you don't already have in your collection and/or doing anything extra for your participants (awards, prizes for winners, etc.).
- 2. What grade levels?** This first year (2023-2024) will be middle school only. Middle grades include 6th, 7th, and 8th. If your school still considers 6th grade as elementary, you can decide if you want them to compete in the middle grade level or wait until an elementary level is created.
- 3. What are the books?** Trying to keep the cost down to a minimum, this year we will utilize titles that most libraries have in their collections. Books chosen will have a variety of genres, formats, and reading levels. I am hoping to have a list finalized by the first week of May. Lists will also be given to local libraries and will be available on Libby.
- 4. Do students have to read all the titles?** No. Teams can decide if they want to split the list between members, have all members read all titles, or assign specific ones. If a parent does not want a child to read a specific title, it will not be required of that child to read it.
- 5. How do I run it?** This program is extremely flexible – especially at the school level. Some hold morning battles before the first bell, others after school, and some even hold lunch battles! Questions will be sent out in the fall for school battles to begin in January (See the tentative timeline). How you run it at your school is completely up to you! Some do trivia style, jeopardy with buzzers, others do it quiz style with Kahoot or even just good 'ole paper and pencil.

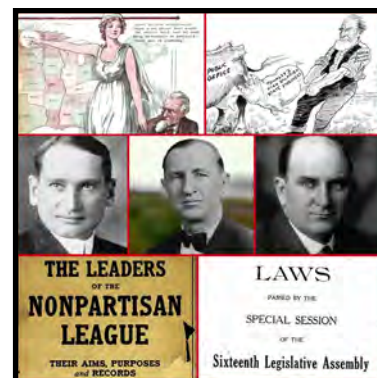

Political Prairie Fire

The newest collection on Digital Horizons comes from the North Dakota State Library (NDSL). The "Political Prairie Fire" collection is dedicated to the Nonpartisan League (NPL) and Independent Voters Association (IVA) era of North Dakota history, circa the 1910s-1930s. The collection includes many images, documents, videos, books, and cartoons relating to this era of political strife in North Dakota. Thus, it contains internal content digitized by NDSL that is directly hosted within the collection as well as external content contributed by other cultural heritage institutions. Links to the external content are provided within the item records, or they are embedded.
