Literacy in America: The Science of Reading

What does the success of our future generations look like when only 31% of 4thgrade North Dakota students are considered proficient readers (Ellis, C., et.al)? Last week, I shared a report from the National Council on Teacher Quality highlighting the statistics from North Dakota. If you missed the report, you can find it <u>here</u>. The report analyzes state teacher preparation programs and how they align to the Science of Reading (SoR). Over the next several weeks, I will be sharing what the Science of Reading is, what the report says about ND, what SoR looks like in the classroom, and how library media specialists can partner with classroom teachers to provide more support during and after instruction.

Before we can talk about the report, it's crucial to understand what exactly is the Science of Reading? According to an article from the Institute of Multi-Sensory Education, the Science of Reading is "a comprehensive body of research that encompasses years of scientific knowledge, spans across many languages, and shares the contributions of experts from relevant disciplines such as education, special education, literacy, psychology, neurology, and more" (Ordetx). Rather than a canned curriculum or a one-size-fits-all process, SoR takes years and years of reading instruction and research to provide evidence-based principles for a framework of best practices and methods. Most recently, education has seen a surge of SoR talk and resources. To understand the context for this surge, we need to take a trip down memory lane.
