

New Library Vision Grants Opening in January

Applications for three new grant opportunities will be opening January 2, 2024. Two grants, Public Spaces and Security, are open to all academic, school, public, special, and Tribal North Dakota libraries that are state or federally funded (non-private). The application periods for these close at 11:59 PM on January 31. The Tribal College Library General grant application period also opens on January 2 but does not close until 11:59 PM on March 31. The Tribal College Library General grant is only open to Tribal College Libraries that are located within the borders of North Dakota. If you are interested in applying for one of these grants, please watch the recording of the November 2023 webinar covering these grants as it is a requirement for receiving them. The Public Spaces grant is for up to \$15,000 and will be for creating or renovating a public space. Examples of eligible items include furniture, shelving, artwork, paint, and flooring. The Security grant is also for up to \$15,000 and will be for items relating to physical and/or cybersecurity and can include items like security cameras, locks, alarms, antivirus software and firewalls. This grant also allows for a needed expansion of an existing security system. For more examples and details, be sure to look at the grant guidelines.

The Tribal College Library General grant is for up to \$10,000 and is an open grant that can include most library expenses except for what are considered capital expenses. This grant will require enough detail in the narrative to understand the purpose of the grant and what items will be purchased. We encourage those applying for this grant to reach out to our Library Development department so that we can assist with the grant writing process.

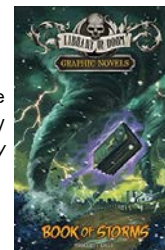
Book of Storms by Daniel Mauleon

According to the National Archives, "The Constitution might never have been ratified if the framers had not promised to add a Bill of Rights. The first ten amendments to the Constitution gave citizens more confidence in the new government and contain many of today's Americans' most valued freedoms." On December 15, 1791, three-fourths of the existing State Legislatures ratified the first 10 Amendments of the Constitution, The Bill of Rights. These Amendments protect some of the most indispensable rights and liberties that define us as Americans. Though we have often struggled to live up to the promises they contain, 230 years after the ratification of the Bill of Rights, respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms remains at the center of our democracy. 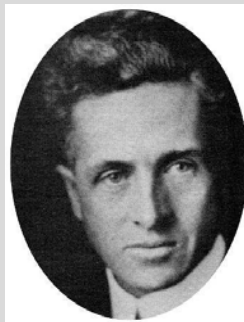

- **Disclaimer** - Disclaimer statement on nd.gov protecting against legal liability of state websites.
- **Privacy Policy** - Privacy policy on nd.gov describing the way websites may gather information about website visitors and how that information may be used or retained.
- **Security Policy** - Security policy statement of how websites are protected by security measures on nd.gov.

Applicants may request:

- One (1) monetary grant in support of a community-oriented project for up to \$1,000.
or
- A book donation (*in-kind donation*) grant donation of up to \$1,000 in equivalent value to support a circulating collection in your library.

Applications must be submitted by **December 15, 2023**.

Notifications of funding decision will be sent to applicants by **March 8, 2024**.

Funded projects must be completed by **December 31, 2024**.

Project reports must be submitted by **February 1, 2025**.

The program will award grants to libraries that demonstrate a true need. Monetary grants are not limited to literacy and may be used for everything from library programming and books to resources like hotspots that help community members access important information. Library seeking support for digital collections should request a monetary grant.
