#### **Minot Air Force Base Library**

North Dakota's military bases often have different needs than most libraries could adequately provide for. From the individuals and families that live on base to the needs of the people that work in the different departments, there is such a wide variety of needs that libraries on bases like Minot Air Force Base are better equipped to provide. Minot Air Force Base's Library serves the Air Force Base, the people and the families stationed there, and retirees. They combine being a public library and an academic library with extra military parts on the side.

Construction on Minot Air Force Base started in May 1956 after Minot businessmen and citizens donated roughly \$50,000 to buy the first parcels of land for the base. The first building was accepted by the base on January 10, 1957. The base filled the need for a fighter interceptor base tasked with protecting the northern border of the United States from Soviet bombers The library on base started in a dorm in 1959 and they got their own building in 1964. Their current building was built in 1990. Current base population totals 12,825, including military personnel and retirees, their dependents, and civilians. All of these people are served by the Base Library.

# Starting a Podcast: Part 3 – Naming Your Podcast and Format

Part 3 of this series on starting a library podcast is about choosing a format and naming your podcast.

The name of your podcast is a pretty important aspect. It should be something short and catchy, while also being unique. Make sure you search online for your title ideas before deciding on one to make sure that it isn't already taken.



Next up is the format.

Interview: This is a very popular format, but it can take a lot of work since you will need to find people to interview. While finding someone to be interviewed can be difficult, this person also needs to be interesting and good at being interviewed. For interview podcasts, you will want to talk with the guest to ensure they know what will be expected of them – types of questions/topics that you'll bring up. While it might be nice to send them all the questions you'll be asking, this can make it seem too rigid. The guest may write down their answers and just read them to you instead of being engaged in the conversation. You also want to have the ability and freedom to ask other questions that might come up based on the answers the guest gives to your initial questions.

# **Agency Allocating Funds for Homeless Services**

#### North Dakota Housing Finance Agency

North Dakota Housing Finance Agency (NDHFA) is now accepting applications from homeless service providers seeking funding through the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) and North Dakota Homeless Grant (NDHG).

"NDHFA's collaboration with local service providers is essential to reaching as many people as possible," said Dave Flohr, NDHFA executive director. "These grants provide financial support for critical services aimed at assisting the state's unhoused population."

ESG and NDHG funds provide financial support to eligible local government and nonprofit organizations who offer emergency shelter, supportive services, and financial assistance to individuals experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. Funds may be used to:

- Engage homeless individuals and families living on the street.
- Improve the number and quality of emergency shelters for homeless individuals and families.
- · Assist in the operation of shelters.
- · Provide essential services to shelter residents.
- · Rapidly re-house individuals and families experiencing homelessness.
- · Prevent families and individuals from becoming homeless.

The application process for awarding funds is competitive and based on the selection criteria outlined in the allocation plan. The deadline for submissions is 5 p.m. CDT on May 30, 2025. Funding amounts through ESG and NDHG will be announced at a later date.
