
Celebrate with Us!

Did you know your library card gives you free access to Mango Languages? Mango is an easy-to-use online platform that helps you learn over 70 different languages—including languages like Russian, Arabic, Pirate, Cherokee, German, and Potawatomi.

Whether you're brushing up on Shakespearean English, preparing for a trip to Mexico or Spain, or even learning English as a second language, Mango offers lessons that are fun, interactive, and self-paced. Lessons are designed to be engaging and get users speaking from the beginning and adapts to how you learn, making every user's experience unique to them.

Why try Mango?

- · Cultural notes apply context to lessons, creating a deeper understanding
- Differentiating between literal meanings and understood meanings gives users more understanding of idioms, figures of speech, and non-translatable concepts that are unique to each language
- Voice recording and comparison gives feedback on pronunciation to build more confident speakers
- Designed to introduce words and phrases at intervals while continuing to build on previously introduced concepts

This September, as we celebrate **National Literacy Month**, it's a great time to expand your learning. Literacy isn't just about reading—it's about strengthening communication, building bridges, and honoring heritage. Mango is one more way our library helps you do just that.

<u>Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library</u> is hosting a Silent Reading Party where participants can take a night to unplug, unwind, and read under the open sky on August 28 and September 16 (6:00 PM - 7:30 PM).

Construction on the <u>Dickinson Area Public Library's</u> \$3.1 million expansion will begin this fall.

<u>Grand Forks Public Library</u> is hosting a Local Author Fair on September 13 from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM. This event will be packed with Red River Valley talent, brand-new reads, and plenty of story magic.

<u>Heart of America Library</u> will be hosting a presentation on human trafficking by the 31:8 Project on Thursday, September 11.

Mayville Public Library received a \$2,000 donation from the Karlstad Family.

Minot Public Library has a mascot - <u>Blaze the Dragon</u> - voted on by the community. <u>Summer reading participants</u> logged 42,288 days of reading, which equals more than 115 years. More than 1,400 people signed up for the program with 894 completing it. They are also restarting their <u>Chess Club</u>, which will meet the first and third Tuesday of every month.

The North Dakota Book and Arts Festival, an annual celebration of books, writers, and creativity that brings together authors, readers, and artists from across the state and region, will be taking place on Saturday, September 20, at the Reiland Fine Arts Center on the University of Jamestown campus from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM. This event is free and open to the public.
