The Farmer's Lawyer:The North Dakota Nine and the Right to Save the Family Farm by Sarah Vogel

Summary: Sarah Vogel, lawyer and single mom, takes on a national class action suit due to the farming crisis of the 1980s. (This suit later results in the passing of the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987.) A combination of drought, failed political policy, land and yield pricing, and



past debts from when farming was more profitable results in several farmers across the country not being able to pay back their balances. This leads to massive foreclosures, freezing of bank accounts, and overall hurt to farms and their local communities. The U.S. has not seen such economic devastation since the Great Depression! Many of Sarah's clients do not pay her - they simply could not afford to - which results in Vogel losing her house and having to move herself and her son in with her parents. Sarah's father, also a lawyer, along with numerous other law-practicing friends and associates, help this "writing" lawyer take on her first trial and win! This book contains quite a bit of political and economic background, as well as some insider knowledge of how farms operate. Sarah Vogel's The Farmer's Lawyer: The North Dakota Nine and the Right to Save the Family Farm was North Dakota's Great Reads from Great Places adult pick for 2022.

According to *Kirkus*, <u>Scott Campbell's</u> <u>Cabin Head and Tree Head</u> is "A wildly original tale with the buddy-based charm of Frog and Toad but imbued with a wacky energy all its own." IMLS Sponsors Freedom Trucks to Celebrate America's 250th Birthday

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has awarded America250, the bipartisan organization charged by Congress to lead the commemoration of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, a grant to launch six mobile exhibits known as "Freedom Trucks" to travel across the country throughout 2026, sharing the story of our nation's founding. The project directly supports the January 29, 2025, Presidential Executive Order, "Celebrating America's 250th Birthday."

The mobile exhibits will highlight the key people, places, and events that gave birth to American independence, and will stop at local libraries, schools, and community gatherings. At a time when 64 percent of Americans cannot pass the citizenship test, these key exhibits aim to make our nation's history more accessible and reinforce patriotism among Americans of all ages.

"As we approach America's 250 birthday, it's never been more important to teach the next generation of our nation's proud history and founding principles," said IMLS Acting Director Keith Sonderling. "Our new Freedom Trucks aim to reignite patriotism, celebrate our shared heritage, enhance local community celebrations, and ensure every American has the chance to learn about the ideals that made our country the greatest in the world. IMLS is proud to have sponsored this traveling exhibit and invite participants to learn more about our rich history at their local libraries and museums."

Inspired by the <u>VA250 Mobile Museum Experience</u>, the Freedom Trucks will bring history to life with inspiring, factual content, including digital and interactive material. Based on the concept of the Freedom Train, one of the most memorable and educational aspects of the bicentennial, they are poised to become the largest traveling exhibit on America's founding.

"The Freedom Trucks will bring the story of America's founding directly to communities nationwide — reminding us that our nation was built by the courage, sacrifice, and vision of everyday patriots," said Jennifer Condon, Executive Vice President at America250. "This initiative embodies America250's mission to unite our nation, spark civic renewal, and encourage reflection on the values that continue to guide us today."

Libraries, museums, and other organizations will be invited to participate in the mobile exhibit tour, and audiences nationwide will be able to engage with the content virtually throughout 2026.

<u>Category – Library Staff Training and Development</u> New Tutorial: <u>Library Foundational Training (LiFT)</u>

This is a new series developed by WebJunction and the Idaho Commission for Libraries (ICFL), Library Foundational Training (LiFT). For those of us old enough to remember Alternative Basic Library Education (ABLE), this program was developed by the Idaho Commission for Libraries back in 1998. These courses were designed to provide non-degreed librarians with professional development opportunities to help them become better informed and trained librarians by providing the basics in reference services, collection management, early childhood and young adult services, and technical services. The Library Foundational Training (LiFT) courses are an upgraded version of ABLE, starting with their Collection Development sequence. These courses are intended to address the training needs of predominantly non-degreed library staff who are new to their current position, or new to working in libraries. You will need to sign into WebJunction or create a free WebJunction account to take these courses.

State School for the Blind, Bathgate, N.D.

This photograph shows a large brick building. A staircase leads up to the front entrance. Notice the architecture on the roof at center.



Between 1908 and 1961 this building served as the State School for the Blind in Bathgate. The School for the Blind was moved to Grand Forks in 1961. After that the building in Bathgate was made into a rest home for 60 residents. Today it is owned by Bethlehem Community. The Community publishes books for Home-School families.
