New Digital Collection

The North Dakota State Library (NDSL) has a new digital collection. The "North Dakota School for the Blind" collection is a partnership between NDSL and the North Dakota Vision Services/School for the Blind (NDVS/SB). The collection contains biennial reports, images, documents, and books relating to the North Dakota School for the Blind, since its inception in the early 1900s to the present.



The NDVS/SB has existed since 1905, when it was established by the North Dakota Legislative Assembly. In 1908, the School for the Blind opened in Bathgate. Several years later, in 1961, the school relocated to Grand Forks.

The digital collection currently contains 75 items, and it is organized into three sub-collections: <u>Biennial Reports</u>, <u>Images</u>, and <u>Publications</u> (like documents or books). More information about the collection is available in its finding aid on <u>NDSL's LibGuides</u>.

Entries Wanted for "I Voted" Sticker Design Contest

The North Dakota Secretary of State has an exciting opportunity for artists of all ages to contribute their talents to North Dakota's electoral process and become part of our state's election history.

The "I Voted - More Than Just a Sticker" contest invites North Dakotans to design the next official "I Voted" sticker, which will debut at polling locations statewide during the June 9, 2026, Primary Election.



Submissions will be accepted online or by mail until November 15, 2025. A panel will select the top designs, and the public will vote for the winner, which will be announced in March 2026. In addition to seeing their design being worn by voters across the state, the winner will receive a professionally framed copy of their design and recognition from Secretary Howe during an official ceremony in Bismarck.

Libraries can share this opportunity by posting information about the contest on bulletin boards and encouraging patrons to submit a design.
