2025 Public Library Services for Strong Communities Survey

The <u>2025 Public Library Services for Strong Communities Survey</u> fielded by the Public Library Association is now open. Questions on this year's annual survey ask about how libraries contribute to sustaining and meeting the needs of their communities with programs, services, partnerships, and facilities. Similar questions were asked on the <u>2022 Services Survey</u> – the baseline year for this topic – so that we can now see in 2025 how the field has evolved.

All public libraries are invited to participate in PLA's annual surveys. Log into your library's free Benchmark account to complete the survey. One person should submit the survey on behalf of their library – often that's the library director, administrator, or data coordinator. Libraries that complete this year's survey will automatically be entered to win one of seven \$100 gift cards for Bookshop.org or a free PLA 2026 conference registration with travel stipend for a library staff member.

The survey closes **Saturday**, **December 13**, **2025**. Take a few minutes to contribute to the national conversation about the support libraries provide to their communities through programs and partnerships, or through services offered via their library facilities. What's New in Niche



With all this access, it's more important now than ever to develop good critical thinking skills.

Niche Academy has developed a series of tutorials called Critical Thinking Skills that we can use to shape our thinking, to avoid the pitfalls of falsehoods and become better communicators. These tutorials can be found in the North Dakota Library Academy under the category Information Literacy.

Five new tutorials have been added to this collection, bringing the total to fifteen tutorials. Our latest additions include Active Listening, Challenging Your Own Ideas, Expertise and Authority, Making and Supporting Claims, and Slippery Slope.

Other subjects in this area that are covered by these Critical Thinking Skills tutorials include Loaded Questions, Straw Man Arguments, Lateral Reading, False Equivalencies, and other topics pertaining to our ability to think critically.
