Popular examples include: ChatGPT, Claude, Copilot, Gemini, Grok, Meta AI, Perplexity, etc. That was a lot of terms and abbreviations, but they're not important right now. What is important to remember is that the use of GenAI continues to rise, and these tools are becoming increasingly integrated into our lives.

GenAl has great potential. It can increase efficiency, and it can analyze and process data much faster than humans. GenAl can proofread and provide suggestions to strengthen your writing. GenAl can generate ideas and brainstorm if you're stuck.

#### Silent Book Club

In 2012, two friends met at a wine bar to read together. They both liked books and reading, but they hadn't been able to get a book club to stay together. They decided to remove the most stressful parts of a book club (everyone finding a copy of the same book and discussing it), and the Silent Book Club was born.



The goal of the Silent Book Club organization is to unite book lovers through a mutual love of reading. If you are participating in a silent book club, all you need to do is bring your favorite book to the agreed upon location and read for an hour. Title, format, genre...none of that matters, and there is no requirement to talk about what you're reading. Meetings end with an opportunity to socialize if desired.

This type of low-key gathering is a great way to build community without increasing stress. It's also a good way to lure out the introverts in your service area. There are few who can withstand the lure of light snacks with company that you don't need to interact with if you do not want to.

The Silent Book Club organization does more than provide an organizing umbrella for other Silent Book Clubs. They also organize <u>Reading Retreats</u>. A reading retreat is a curated travel experience complete with sight-seeing (and plenty of time to read). Upcoming trips will take readers to Italy and Hawaii.

It's important to note that Silent Book Club is a trademarked name, and if you want to use that name, you should start an <u>official chapter</u>. If you would rather run your club independent from the Silent Book Club organization, you will need to use a different name (BYOBook Club, Quiet Book Club, etc.). We do have several official chapters scattered around North Dakota. If you think that this is something your community could use, consider adding a Silent Book Club to your programming repertoire!

### Is Social Media Use Affecting Reading Skills?

Both adults and young people consume social media daily, but does social media affect young people's brains differently? Does social media use affect learning habits in those whose brains are still developing? The answer to these questions is yes. According to Dr. Omer Awan, "From adolescents to young adults, social media plays a huge role in shaping cognitive and emotional growth" (How, 2024).

#### Patterns of Teen Social Media Use

A July 2025 fact sheet released by the Pew Research Center provides patterns and trends of social media use in teens ages 13 to 17. Please use the source link to review the information in its entirety. Here are a few highlights:

- YouTube (top used platform)
  - $\circ~$  90% of all U.S. teens reported usage
  - $\circ~93\%$  of boys use YouTube, while 87% of girls use the platform
- TikTok
  - 63% of all U.S. teens reported usage
  - 59% of boys use TikTok, while 66% of girls use the platform
- Instagran
  - o 61% of all U.S. teens reported usage
  - 56% of boys use TikTok, while 66% of girls use the platform
- SnapChat
  - $\circ~55\%$  of all U.S. teens reported usage
  - $\circ~$  53% of boys use TikTok, while 57% of girls use the platform
