“Call Me Jerry,” a new biography of Gerald W. VandeWalle, North Dakota’s longest-serving Supreme Court Chief Justice, has been commissioned by the Trustees of the John & Elaine Andrist Charitable Trust. The book was released on February 2, 2026, during an event at the North Dakota Heritage Center with VandeWalle and author Cecile Wehrman.

The Trustees of the John & Elaine Andrist Charitable Trust have graciously offered to donate free copies of *Call Me Jerry* to North Dakota libraries, including shipping. ### About the Book

VandeWalle’s remarkable 65-year career in state government began in 1958 as the “baby attorney” at the State Attorney General’s office and concluded in 2023 after 45 years of service on the Supreme Court bench, more than half of that time as Chief Justice.

During his tenure, the court oversaw a complete restructuring of the state’s judicial system; impacted the direction of school funding toward a more equitable distribution of funds; established a family law mediation process for better outcomes in custody cases; and issued ground-breaking opinions on topics still reverberating today – among them rulings on same sex custody arrangements and the taxation of out-of-state companies.

The boy from Noonan, ND, never forgot the lessons he learned growing up on a dairy farm, nor the people who helped shape his values. The book details the remarkable family into which he was born, including a World War I hero for a father and a mom who was a debate champion. It follows him through his discovery of the law as a vocation while attending the University of North Dakota, formative professional experiences through 20 years in the attorney general’s office, and to his initially bumpy rise to the Supreme Court in 1978.

# Navigating Counting Opinions

Counting Opinions is the company the State Library contracts with to administer the Public Libraries Survey. Whether you are a PLS veteran or newbie, it is beneficial to familiarize yourself with the platform. Don't worry. Your account permissions only allow you to fill out the survey. You can't break anything.

## Step 1: Log in.

Your username and password were assigned when your account was set up. If you have lost your log in information, please contact [ndsl-id@nd.gov](mailto:ndsl-id@nd.gov) to obtain your credentials.

## Step 2: Enter the survey.

The landing page for Counting Opinions is easy. Just click Enter to join the party.



## Step 3: Input your data.

Some fields are greyed out. These are prefilled by the State Library. If that information is not correct, please notify Monica Struck at [ndsl-id@nd.gov](mailto:ndsl-id@nd.gov) so that the data can be corrected.

The questions largely fall into two categories: Y/N/M and Short Answer. The short answer fields are usually numbers (How many hours are you open on a normal Tuesday? What is the annual salary of the director?) but sometimes ask you to make a list (List social media platforms you use). There are a few questions that ask you to choose an option from a dropdown menu. Please fill in an answer for every question. Sometimes the answer is 0. Please answer 0. Sometimes the answer is "I don't know." Believe it or not, the appropriate response to that is -1. I'm not sure why. I don't make the rules. I just follow them. Be sure to save your work!

## Step 4: Verify your data.

Click Verify at the top right of the survey screen. This will trigger Counting Opinions to look for errors in your data.



## Step 5: Address your edit checks.

Counting Opinions will flag answers that don't seem quite right. Things will be flagged if they are extremely different or exactly the same as the previous year. It will also flag if proportions are wrong (You report higher expenditures than income. You report attendees for a type of program but no programs in that category). Sometimes it can be confusing as to why something is being flagged. If you have questions about your edit checks, please contact Monica at [ndsl-id@nd.gov](mailto:ndsl-id@nd.gov). Edit checks are addressed by adding notes. To add a note, click on the notepad to the immediate left of the answer field.



Enter your note and click Add. This saves your note and unflags the edit check.

## Step 6: Submit your data.

You've finally arrived at the end. Do not skip this vitally important step. If your data is not submitted, you haven't actually completed the survey. When you submit your survey, you get an email from Counting Opinions. If you aren't sure if you've submitted your survey, please contact [ndsl-id@nd.gov](mailto:ndsl-id@nd.gov).
