Changing the PLS

The Public Libraries Survey is a continuously evolving instrument. Each state can ask questions that they deem important, but there are also federal questions that are answered by everyone. The State Data Coordinators (SDCs) work with the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and the American Institutes for Research (AIR) to make sure that the federal level questions are gathering data points that are useful. This means that survey questions are updated regularly. Sometimes it's just a definition update; sometimes questions are removed; and sometimes questions are added.

As you can imagine, any process that involves changing federal level data collection has a lot of steps. For the PLS, this process begins in August with change request proposals solicitation. This window lasts 30 days after which eligible changes are brought to the Library Statistics Working Group (LSWG). This group consists of SDCs, IMLS staff, and researchers. LSWG breaks into committees to review the proposed changes between December and May. At the conclusion of the review period, the subcommittees provide recommendations as to which proposals should be brought forward. Roughly 30 days after the LSWG has received the recommendations, the ballot is sent to the State Library Administrative Agencies (SLAAs). The State Librarian and SDC both submit the ballot. At the Fall LSWG meeting, the ballots are counted, and the results are announced in October. In December, the new elements are officially announced, and they are added to the PLS in January the year following.

OpenAI, the company behind ChatGPT, had [an ad for its Codex tool](#) that did not make much sense. OpenAI's rival, Anthropic took [expensive](#) shots at ChatGPT (and its plan to start including ads in its chats) with [multiple ads](#) featuring its product Claude. Anthropic has touted itself as a more responsible AI company. However, like other companies, there are serious questions over how Anthropic [trained its chatbot](#).

Amazon [promoted its new AI-powered Alexa+](#) with the help of actor Chris Hemsworth, Google had a [heartfelt ad](#) promoting its product Gemini, and Meta showed off its [AI-enabled glasses](#).

Microsoft recycled a [football-focused ad for Copilot](#), and Genspark recruited Matthew Broderick to promote the product's efficiency. Broderick reprised his Ferris Bueller persona and helped others [take the rest of the day off](#).

Lastly, [AI.com had a confusing ad](#), but it was seemingly effective. The website could not handle the amount of traffic visiting it, and it promptly [crashed](#).
