Brynhild Haugland: Transforming Your Press Kit from Static to Strategic

Program Description: Your library's press kit shouldn't just sit on your website or a shelf gathering dust. It should be a living document that tells your library's story, builds media relationships, and supports your outreach goals. This session covers the elements, formats, and ideas to make your press kit a strategic tool that works for your library, whether you are starting from scratch or refreshing your outdated version.
