His role focuses on leading outreach to underserved special population communities to better understand needs, facilitate information sharing and improve health outcomes while working with local health units and community organizations to address health inequities in North Dakota. Jorden has worked within the public health sector for 13 years and serves as a liaison between the North Dakota Department of Health and Human Serveries and Special Populations to promote access to health services across North Dakota.
