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## PREFACE WHAT IS KIDS COUNT?

KIDS COUNT, a project of the Annie E. Casey Foundation, is a national and state-by-state effort to track the well-being of children in the United States. At the national level, the project develops and distributes reports on key areas of well-being, including the annual KIDS COUNT Data Book, and explores the well-being of children using current data and policy analysis. The Foundation also maintains the KIDS COUNT Data Center, which uses the best available data to measure the educational, social, economic, and physical well-being of children. The Data Center features hundreds of indicators with more than four million data points. Users of the site are able to view national, congressional district, county, school district, and city data from across the country (http://datacenter.kidscount. org). The Annie E. Casey Foundation funds a network of state-level organizations in all 50 states, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the District of Columbia that provide a community-by-community picture of the condition of children. Both national and state KIDS COUNT programs strive to document conditions affecting children in the areas where they live so that national, state, and local decision-making can more effectively address children's needs through sound policy creation. ## WHAT IS THE NORTH DAKOTA KIDS COUNT FACT BOOK?

The *North Dakota KIDS COUNT Fact Book*, now in its 19<sup>th</sup> year, is an annual publication that provides state, regional, and county profiles consisting of multiple indicators nested within six components of child well-being (i.e., demographics, family and community, economic wellbeing, education and early care, health, and safety and risky behavior). Beginning in 2005, the *Fact Book* became an electronic publication only.

#### **REPORT FORMAT**

The 2013 *North Dakota KIDS COUNT Fact Book* is divided into three main sections.

#### **Summary and Findings**

This section provides a summary of trends and an overview of findings for multiple indicators nested within six components of child well-being. The six components include:

Demographics Family and Community Economic Well-Being Education and Early Care Health Safety and Risky Behavior

## State, Regional, and County Profiles

Separate three-page profiles containing indicators within the six components of child well-being are provided for the state, the state's eight planning regions, and the 53 counties in North Dakota. Actual numbers of children or events are presented along with percentages that allow countyto-county and region-to-region comparisons. Data presented in the state profile are repeated in each county and regional profile for easy comparison.

#### **Definitions and Data Sources**

This section supplies explanations and indicator definitions along with limitations and information sources for respective data. Readers are strongly encouraged to use these definitions for clarification and reference for the data provided.

#### MODIFICATIONS

The following modifications were made to the *Fact Book* in this year's publication:

- 1. A new indicator has been added to the Family and Community component of the 2013 *Fact Book* that looks at Children Ages 0-13 with All Parents in Labor Force, by Age. In an effort to capture the number of children in North Dakota who potentially need child care, the *Fact Book*, historically, has monitored the number of working mothers. We now have access to the number of children living in households for which all the parents in the household are in the labor force. While not all children in these situations may need child care, this indicator offers a good approximation of the number of children potentially needing care.
- 2. To get a better sense of the supply and demand of child care in North Dakota, we have changed the denominator of the child care capacity indicators (in the Education and Early Care component) to reflect the new estimates of the number of children who potentially need care, i.e., Children Ages 0-13 with All Parents in Labor Force (see number 1 above). Previously, we were using all children ages 0 through 13 in a particular geography. This new denominator will help to show how current child care capacity in an area is meeting the potential demand.
- 3. An additional new indicator to the Family and Community component is Employed Youth Ages 16-24, by Age. Employment can provide valuable experience for youth by teaching responsibility, developing organizational and time management skills, and helping youth save money for post-secondary education. Jobs can also help youth form good work habits, gain valuable work experiences, and become financially independent. However, studies also show that for high school students who work more than 20 hours a week, employment can interfere with academic achievement and distract from other beneficial activities. Current data indicate that North Dakota leads the nation in the proportion of youth ages 16 through 24 who are working (i.e., 62% in 2011 compared to 48% nationwide).
- 3. Within the Health component, we include the Number of Uninsured Children Ages 0-18 and the Number of Uninsured Children At or Below 200% of Poverty. Both indicators, historically, were presented as a percentage of all children ages 0 through 18. In order to get a better sense of the uninsured who are eligible for existing health insurance coverage programs, we changed the denominator of Uninsured Children At or Below 200% of Poverty from all children to all uninsured children. The current data indicate that close to 60 percent of all uninsured children are at or below 200 percent of poverty; thus, they are potentially eligible for coverage through Medicaid, Healthy Steps, or Caring for Children.

## Methodology

#### LIMITATIONS

#### General

Overall, indicators have been chosen on the basis of their availability by county, their ability to convey broad elements of child well-being, the extent to which they provide for common interpretation, the possibility of their availability over time, their usefulness as a tool to track longterm trends in child well-being, and the validity of data sources.

It must be noted that not all children affected by a particular condition are reported to or identified by the proper authorities, nor are they all enrolled in an appropriate service program. Therefore, caution must be exercised in concluding these data represent the actual number of children whose lives may be affected by a given situation.

North Dakota KIDS COUNT gathers and organizes, but does not generate, the statistical information contained in the *Fact Book*. Please refer to the Definitions and Data Sources section for limitations and notes specific to each indicator.

#### American Indian Children

The 2013 North Dakota KIDS COUNT Fact Book data include American Indian children living outside American Indian tribal areas in all indicators. American Indian children living within tribal areas are included in all indicators with the following exceptions: data for Child Abuse and Neglect Reports and Victims exclude tribal data; WIC data exclude the Fort Berthold Reservation and the Standing Rock Reservation: Domestic Violence data exclude all tribal areas with the exception of Spirit Lake Reservation; and Juvenile Court Referral data exclude tribal court referrals (see map on page 19 for tribal areas in North Dakota).

## DEMOGRAPHICS

In 2012, North Dakota became the fastest growing state in the U.S., growing 2 percent from 2011 – three times the national average.

### SUMMARY AND FINDINGS

#### Population

Energy development activity in western North Dakota has significantly changed historical population trends within the state. After decades of population loss, shifting migration patterns and an increase in total births has resulted in significant growth for the state. According to the 2012 population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, North Dakota has 699,628 residents, a record high. In fact, from 2011 to 2012, North Dakota was the fastest growing state in the U.S. growing at 2 percent, which is three times the national average.

In 2011, there were 683,932 North Dakota residents. Children ages 0 through 17 comprised 22 percent of the total population (i.e., 151,156 children). After nearly two decades of continuous loss, the number of children has grown consistently since 2008, by approximately 2 percent annually through 2011.

Nearly half of North Dakota counties (24 of 53) had an increase in their child population from 2010 to 2011, with the fastest growth counties located in western North Dakota (e.g., McKenzie 11%, Williams 9%, Burke 7%, Golden Valley 7%, Slope 6%, and Stark 5%).

#### **Total Births**

The number of young children ages 0 through 5 began to grow in 2003, which parallels the upswing in total births. After decades of decline, total births began to increase in 2002 when there were 7,755 births. By 2011, there were 9,234 births recorded statewide by the North Dakota Department of Health.

Births to teenagers in North Dakota totaled 634 in 2011, which is 7 percent of all births statewide. While this proportion is relatively unchanged since 2006 and down from the earliest part of the decade, the teen birth rate (i.e., teen births per 1,000 girls ages 15 through 19) rose from 25.6 in 2004 to 27.6 in 2011. Nationally, the teen birth rate dropped by 24 percent since 2004, from 41 per 1,000 to 34.

#### **Race and Ethnicity**

Race and ethnicity have important implications for culture, identity, and well-being. Children of different races and ethnicities often show large variation in well-being including health, mortality, school performance and attainment, and access to family and community resources<sup>1</sup>.

The racial mix among North Dakota children is changing modestly. Over the past decade, the proportion of the state's child population that is white (i.e., 139,008 children in 2011) decreased from 88 percent in 2000 to 86 percent in 2011. During the same time, the state has seen an increase in the number of minority children. Native American children, North Dakota's largest minority group, grew 14 percent from 2000 to 2011. The state's smaller minority child populations grew much faster. From 2000 to 2011, the number of Asian children grew 59 percent, Hispanic children grew 87 percent, and children reported as black grew 124 percent.

## Family and Community

#### SUMMARY AND FINDINGS

#### **Living Arrangements**

While the majority of all North Dakota children ages 0 through 17 live with their parents, the composition of families is changing. Currently, 2011 data indicate that nearly three-fourths of North Dakota children live with both parents (72%). This proportion is down from 82 percent in 1990. At the same time, the proportion of children living with a single parent is growing. In 1990, 14 percent of children lived with a single parent. This proportion increased to 22 percent in 2011. Other family arrangements include children living with their grandparents. In 2011, 3 percent of North Dakota children lived in a grandparent-headed household (5,049 children), which is up from 2 percent in 1990 (2,628 children).

The number of North Dakota children receiving foster care services totaled 1,878 in 2012 (i.e., 1% of all children statewide). The majority of children in foster care in 2012 were in a family home (76%). Nearly one in four children in foster care was in a group home or institution (24%).

One-third of all North Dakota births in 2011 were to unmarried women (33%). The proportion of births to unmarried women was 23 percent in 1994 and grew an average of 3 percent per year through 2005 where it has remained relatively unchanged at 33 percent through 2011. Approximately one in five births to unmarried women in 2011 was to a teenager (18%). Births to unmarried teens ages 12 through 19 totaled 558 in 2011, or 6 percent of all births statewide.

#### **Working Parents**

Most North Dakota children live with their mothers (whether she is married or single) and most North Dakota mothers work. In 2011, 88 percent of all North Dakota children lived with their mother (i.e., with both parents or with a single mother), the largest proportion in the nation. In addition, 83 percent of North Dakota mothers were in the labor force in 2011, the second highest proportion nationwide (behind South Dakota). Nationally, 73 percent of mothers with children ages 0 through 17 were in the labor force in 2011.

A major contributor to financial stability and well-being of children is parents having secure employment<sup>1</sup>. In 2011, 78 percent of children ages 0 through 13 in North Dakota lived in situations for which all parents were in the labor force, which is the third highest proportion among states (behind South Dakota and Iowa). Nationally, 68 percent of children live with parents who are all in the labor force.

#### **Employed Youth**

Employment can provide valuable experience for youth. In moderation, work experience can help youth build skills and can open up valuable opportunities as youth prepare for work and a career<sup>2</sup>. In North Dakota, nearly half of teens ages 16 through 19 were employed in 2011 (46%), which is the largest proportion among states (tied with South Dakota). Among young adults ages 20 through 24 in North Dakota, 73 percent were employed.

Approximately one out of every two teenagers in North Dakota (ages 16-19) is working, the largest proportion nationwide.

### SUMMARY AND FINDINGS

#### **Income and Poverty**

Experiencing unprecedented economic growth, North Dakota is leading the nation in low unemployment<sup>1</sup>, growth in GDP<sup>2</sup>, and increases in per capita personal income<sup>2</sup>. In addition, the median household income for families with children grew to \$66,042 in 2011. Despite this economic boom, child poverty has been largely unaffected by the state's prosperity. Approximately one out of every seven children living in North Dakota is considered impoverished (14% in 2011, or 21,129 children). This proportion has remained unchanged for the past 11 years (since 2000). An additional 14,170 North Dakota children live in families with incomes just above the poverty line (i.e., near poverty) (10% in 2011).

Younger children (i.e., ages 0 through 4) in the state had a higher poverty rate than older children in 2011 (19% compared to 13%, respectively); in six of North Dakota's 53 counties, at least one in three young children was living in poverty. Children living on Native American Indian reservations tend to have the highest poverty rates in North Dakota. Data from 2011 indicate that half of all children in Sioux, Benson, and Rolette counties was impoverished (51%, 51%, and 47%, respectively).

Poverty refers to a condition in which one is unable to afford basic human needs, such as clean water, nutrition, health care, education, clothing, and shelter. Income thresholds used to determine poverty are updated annually by the Census Bureau. In 2011, a four-person family earning \$23,021 or less was considered impoverished<sup>3</sup>.

#### **Public Assistance**

Public benefit programs are available to help low-income families and children in North Dakota. The federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (i.e., SNAP, formerly the Food Stamp Program) helped provide food to 38,493 North Dakota children ages 0 through 18 in 2012 (24% of children statewide). The free or reduced price lunch program served 34,012 North Dakota school children in 2012 (32% of total school enrollment). In five of North Dakota's 53 counties, at least half of students received free or reduced price lunches in 2012 (Sioux, Benson, Rolette, Sheridan, and Mountrail).

The Temporary Assistance to Needy Families Program (TANF), designed to help families in need achieve self-sufficiency, provided assistance to 6,268 North Dakota children ages 0 through 19 in 2012, which is down 10 percent from 2011.

In an effort to allow parents to work or attain the education necessary to become employed and self-sufficient, 6,097 North Dakota children received child care assistance in 2012 (5% of all children ages 0 through 13 statewide).

# Education and Early Care

### SUMMARY AND FINDINGS

#### Enrollment

North Dakota's public schools averaged 98,734 students daily during the 2011-12 academic year. After several years of continued decreases in enrollments, North Dakota's average daily membership in public schools has increased an average of 1 percent per year since 2008-09.

Billings, Divide, and McKenzie counties, all located within western energy development areas, had some of the fastest growth in average daily membership in 2011-12 (26%, 20%, and 10%, respectively). These remarkable growth rates follow years of declines (i.e., 4% per year, on average, for the three-county area from 1996-97 through 2007-08). Overall, 16 of North Dakota's 53 counties reported a loss in average daily membership in 2011-12.

Average expenditures per student were \$10,203 statewide in 2011-12, a 0.5 percent increase from 2010-11.

The number of high school students who were enrolled in school and then dropped out in 2012 totaled 687 (2% of high school enrollment).

In 2012, 13,269 North Dakota children were enrolled in special education (13% of public school enrollment): 31 percent had a specific learning disability, 23 percent had a speech impairment, 6 percent were emotionally disturbed, 6 percent had an intellectual disability, and 6 percent had autism.

#### Achievement

The ability to read proficiently is a fundamental skill that affects the learning experiences and school performance of children and adolescents. Students who are competent readers are more likely to perform well in other subjects, such as math and science<sup>1</sup>. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, only a handful of states have higher performance scores for 4th grade reading and 8th grade math than North Dakota<sup>2</sup>. Even so, only half of the 2012 North Dakota high school graduates were considered ready for college-level reading courses, as measured by the ACT.


ACT, Inc. has developed benchmarks in the areas of English, math, reading, and science to measure what it takes to be successful in standard first-year college courses. Based on these benchmarks, 64 percent of the 2012 ACT-tested North Dakota high school graduates were ready for college English, 45 percent were ready for college math, 49 percent were ready for college reading, and 30 percent were ready for college science. Approximately one in four (23%) were ready for all four courses.

Overall, 2012 high school graduates in North Dakota averaged 20.7 out of a possible 36 on the ACT. The national average was 21.1.

Average daily membership in North Dakota public schools increased for the third straight year in a row, after decades of decline.

Licensed child care providers in North Dakota numbered 1,533 in Feb. 2013 with the capacity to care for 34,545 children, which is 40 percent of the state's potential need.

### SUMMARY AND FINDINGS

#### **Child Care**

As indicated in the Economic Well-Being section, North Dakota is experiencing a financial boom, largely the result of energy development. In addition to low unemployment, North Dakota also ties South Dakota with the largest multiple job holding rate in the nation<sup>1</sup>. This means that most parents are working and are in need of quality child care and early education for their children. As noted in the Family and Community section, 78 percent of North Dakota children live in families where all the parents are in the labor force (i.e., 86,004 children statewide).

Reliable and affordable child care helps children, families, and communities prosper. With dependable child care, parents can be productive at work and school. In addition, research on child care reveals that, on average, for each new dollar spent on child care, the total statewide economic impact is two dollars<sup>2</sup>.

As of February 2013, North Dakota reported 1,533 licensed child care programs with the capacity to care for 34,545 children. This means that licensed child care programs in the state have the ability to meet 40 percent of potential need. According to North Dakota Child Care Resource and Referral, national child care standards recommend that licensed care should meet at least 50 percent of potential need<sup>3</sup>. Currently, only two counties in North Dakota – Cass and Ramsey – meet that minimum.

In the western portion of the state (i.e., Planning Regions 1 and 8), licensed care is meeting less than 30 percent of the potential need. In contrast, licensed care in Planning Region 5 (i.e., Cass, Ransom, Richland, Sargent, Steele, and Traill) is meeting 52 percent of the potential need, the largest proportion among planning regions in the state.

#### **Unlicensed Child Care**

Legally recognized yet unlicensed child care providers in the state included 425 self-certified and in-home providers, 52 registered tribal child care providers, and 401 approved relatives in February 2013.

Informal networks of relatives, friends, and neighbors provide care for many North Dakota children. These situations are difficult to track and the number of providers and quality of care are not monitored.

#### Child Care Cost and Assistance

Child care has become part of the daily routine for thousands of North Dakota families, many of whom are struggling financially. According to 2012 North Dakota Child Care Resource & Referral data, care for one infant in a licensed center averages \$8,066 annually<sup>4</sup>.

As mentioned in the Economic Well-Being component of this report, the Child Care Assistance Program helped low-income families in North Dakota pay child care bills for 6,097 children in 2012, or 5 percent of all children ages 0 through 13 statewide.

#### SUMMARY AND FINDINGS

#### Vital Records

A healthy mother is vital to the health of her child. Prenatal care can improve birth outcomes and is more likely to be effective if begun early in pregnancy<sup>1</sup>. Of the 9,234 North Dakota births in 2011, 502 (5%) were to mothers receiving inadequate prenatal care.

In 2011, 602 babies were born weighing less than 5.5 pounds (or 2,500 grams) in North Dakota. These low birth weight babies comprised 7 percent of all births in 2011. North Dakota consistently ranks among states with the lowest percentage of low birth weight births in the nation<sup>2</sup>.

In 2011, 60 North Dakota babies died within one year of life (0.7% of all births). Of all North Dakota deaths in 2011, 55 were youth ages 1 through 19 (1% of all deaths).

#### **Hearing Impairment**

Hearing loss can affect a child's ability to develop communication, language, and social skills. The earlier that children with a hearing impairment get services, the more likely they are to reach their full potential. In 2012, nearly every newborn in North Dakota was screened for hearing loss (99%); of those screened, 10 percent did not pass the initial screening and were referred for further testing.

#### Assistance

The supplemental nutrition program for women, infants, and children (WIC) provides nutritious foods, nutrition counseling, and health and social service referrals to eligible participants at no charge. The number of North Dakota WIC participants totaled 23,471 in 2012.

To assist North Dakota children needing health care, 52,757 children ages 0 through 20 received health care assistance through Medicaid (28% of youth ages 0 through 20 statewide) in 2012. To help children from working families that earn too much to qualify for full Medicaid coverage but not enough to afford private insurance, the state's Healthy Steps Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) provided premium-free health coverage to 4,076 enrollees in January 2013.

#### **Uninsured Children**

Children without health insurance have limited access to health care, which can lead to a greater risk of illness and hospitalization. In addition, a lack of health insurance can have a negative influence on school attendance and participation in extracurricular activities, and increased financial and emotional stress among parents<sup>3</sup>.

While most children in North Dakota are covered by some form of health insurance, 9,515 were uninsured in 2010, which is 6 percent of all children statewide. The majority of uninsured children live in families with low to moderate incomes and are potentially eligible for coverage programs such as Medicaid, Healthy Steps, or Caring for Children. In 2010, 5,675 uninsured North Dakota children were living at or below 200 percent of poverty, which is 60 percent of all uninsured children statewide.

Health

In 2012, nearly every newborn in North Dakota was screened for hearing loss (99%); of those screened, 10% did not pass and were referred for further testing.

# Safety and Risky Behavior

Approximately 3 percent of North Dakota youth were considered idle (i.e., not in school, not high school graduates, and not working) in 2011 (1,113 youth ages 16 through 19).

#### **Juvenile Court Referrals**

Juvenile delinquency has potentially high stakes for both individuals and society as a whole. Delinquency is linked to higher crime rates in adulthood and other negative outcomes. One estimate suggests that between 50 and 75 percent of adolescents who have spent time in juvenile detention centers are incarcerated later in life<sup>1</sup>.

A total of 4,473 North Dakota juveniles ages 10 through 17 were referred to court a total of 8,512 times in 2012. Each time a juvenile is referred to court, he or she may be charged with multiple offenses. In 2012, North Dakota juveniles were charged with a total of 8,954 offenses. While each referral may have charges for multiple offenses, an offense description is available for the major offense only. Major offenses associated with the 8,512 juvenile court referrals in 2012 include: unruly behavior (23%), offenses against property (22%), alcohol offenses (15%), offenses against person (9%), and other offenses not included in the previously mentioned categories (e.g., disorderly conduct, controlled substance, traffic) (31%).

North Dakota juveniles referred to court as a proportion of all youth ages 10 through 17 has decreased slightly over the past decade. In 2012, 7 percent of all children ages 10 through 17 (4,473 juveniles) were referred to court for various offenses, which is down from 9 percent in 2003.

#### Child Abuse, Neglect, and Domestic Violence

Providing children with safe and secure environments free from abuse and neglect will improve the likelihood of positive educational, emotional, and social outcomes that extend well into adulthood. In 2012, there were 6,856 children suspected of being abused or neglected in North Dakota. When a suspected case of abuse or neglect is investigated by the North Dakota Child Protection Services Program, a determination is made as to whether services are required to provide for the protection and treatment of an abused or neglected child. Following assessments of the 2012 cases by Child Protection Services social workers, it was determined that 1,442 children (21% of all suspected victims) were in high-risk situations requiring immediate services. In eight North Dakota counties, at least one in three reported victims required services.

#### **Idle Teens**

The transition from youth into independent adulthood involves many challenges. While there are multiple pathways to success, the consequences of unemployment, under-employment, or not acquiring post-secondary education can be damaging and enduring. Males who are neither enrolled in school nor working are more likely to engage in delinquent behavior or illegal activities. Females in this group are more likely to become dependent on welfare<sup>2</sup>. North Dakota youth who were not in school, not high school graduates, and not in the labor force (referred to as idle teens) comprised 3 percent of all children ages 16 through 19 in 2011, a rate similar to the national average.





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# County and Tribal Areas Map



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

# Children Ages 0-17 Living in Extreme Poverty

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children ages 0 through 17 who are living in families with incomes below 50% of the federal poverty threshold. The federal poverty thresholds are updated each year by the U.S. Census Bureau and were established in 1964 using guidelines set by the Social Security Administration. Income cutoffs are based on a formula utilizing family and individual income, family size, and age of family members. The formula is based on three times a family's food costs, according to the USDA's most economical food plans. The cost of this food plan is adjusted each year to reflect current economic guidelines. The 2011 poverty thresholds are included in the previous column.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion these children represent of the total child population ages 0 through 17 for whom poverty status is determined in respective geographic areas. Children for whom poverty status is determined include children living in households where they are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. Thus, children living in foster care or in a group/institutional setting are excluded from this indicator. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of residence.

DATE: Data represent a 5-year period estimate. For example, 2011 estimates reflect data collected over a 60-month period from 2007 to 2011.

LIMITATIONS: Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. A 90% margin of error for each estimate can be found at http://www.ndkidscount. org/publications.html. Characteristics for geographic areas experiencing dynamic change due to such things as an environmental catastrophe (e.g., flood) or a plant closing will be mitigated since these estimates cover five calendar years of data. Also, caution is needed when using the multiyear estimates for estimating year-toyear change in a particular characteristic. This is because four of the five years in the 5-year estimate overlap with the next year's estimate. Ideally, trend analysis with

# Median Income of Families with Children Ages 0-17

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the central income point of the total number of families with children ages 0 through 17, including those with no income. The median is reflected in dollars and divides the number of families into two equal parts: half of families with children have incomes above the median and half have incomes below the median.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of residence.

DATE: Data represent a 5-year period estimate. For example, 2011 estimates reflect data collected over a 60-month period from 2007 to 2011.

LIMITATIONS: Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. A 90% margin of error for each estimate can be found at http://www.ndkidscount. org/publications.html. Characteristics for geographic areas experiencing dynamic change due to such things as an environmental catastrophe (e.g., flood) or a plant closing will be mitigated since these estimates cover five calendar years of data. Also, caution is needed when using the multiyear estimates for estimating year-toyear change in a particular characteristic. This is because four of the five years in the 5-year estimate overlap with the next vear's estimate. Ideally, trend analysis with multivear estimates should be done using estimates from non-overlapping periods (i.e., 2005-2009 and 2010-2014). #### **TANF Recipients Ages 0-19**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of persons ages 0 through 19 who are recipients of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and thus automatically eligible for Medicaid (see the *Medicaid Recipients Ages 0-20* indicator in the Health component for a complete definition of the Medicaid program). TANF is a need-based income assistance program

for families with children who need financial support (e.g., a parent is absent from the home, a parent is incapacitated, family income is within the program standards, or countable assets are within the program limits). TANF is not an entitlement program, and adult TANF recipients are limited to a lifetime total of benefits of no more than 60 months; however, the 60 months do not have to be consecutive months. Children who have received TANF benefits for 60 months may receive benefits when they are adults.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion these persons represent of the total population ages 0 through 19 in respective geographic areas. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of

residence.

DATE: Fiscal Year (July 1 through June 30). NOTE: Beginning July 1, 1997, TANF replaced Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC). AFDC was an entitlement program that provided a monthly payment to parents or guardians on behalf of children who were defined as "dependent." AFDC was funded by both the federal and state governments and was administered by the state. Children must have been found eligible to receive such assistance by criteria laid down in federal and state law. Eligible children included needy children who had been deprived of support or care because of death to a caregiver, continued absence of a caregiver from the home, underemployment or unemployment of the principal wage earner, or physical or mental handicap of a caregiver.

# Children Receiving Free or Reduced Price Lunch

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children receiving free or reduced price lunch at school. Children may also receive free or reduced price breakfast and/ or milk. To receive a free meal, household income must be below 130% of the federal poverty threshold. Children in SNAP or TANF families are automatically eligible for free school meals. Families who receive commodity assistance through food distribution programs in American Indian tribal areas are also automatically eligible for free meals. To receive a reduced price meal, household income must be below 185% of the federal poverty threshold. PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the

proportion these children represent of total school enrollment in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the school location, not the student's place of residence. DATE: October.

#### **SNAP Recipients Ages 0-18**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children ages 0 through 18 who are recipients of SNAP. The 2008 Farm Bill renamed the Food Stamp Program the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). SNAP is a uniform, nationwide entitlement program to supplement the nutritional needs of people whose income is at or below the poverty level. Households must meet eligibility requirements. An individual household's SNAP allotment is equal to the maximum allotment for that household's size, less 30% of the household's net income.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion these children represent of the total child population ages 0 through 18 in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of residence.

DATE: Fiscal Year (July 1 through June 30). SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Human Services.

# Child Care Assistance Recipients Ages 0-13

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children ages 0 through 13 whose families receive North Dakota Child Care Assistance. The purpose of the Child Care Assistance Program is to help with child care costs for low-income families while they are working or participating in allowable training or allowable education programs. For eligible families, the North Dakota Department of Human Services pays a percentage of their child care bill determined by using a sliding fee scale. Payment is made directly to the child care provider.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion these children represent of the total child population ages 0 through 13 in respective geographic areas. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of

DATE: Fiscal Year (July 1 through June 30). SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Human Services.

# Average Expenditures Per Student in Public Schools

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the average per student expenditures (in dollars) for instruction, administration, operation, and maintenance for public schools in respective geographic areas during a given school year.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the public school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: Academic Year (Fall through Spring).

SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Public Instruction.

## Average Daily Membership of Public Schools

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the average number of students enrolled per day in public schools for respective geographic areas during a given school year.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the public school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: Academic Year (Fall through Spring).

SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Public Instruction.

# Special Education Enrollment in Public Schools

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of public school children ages 3 through 21 enrolled in special education by age categories and in the following selected special education subcategories: *Emotionally* Disturbed, Speech or Language Impaired, Specific Learning Disability, Intellectual Disability, and Autism. Age categories provided for this indicator include Ages 3-5, Ages 6-11, Ages 12-17, and Ages 18-21. Emotionally Disturbed refers to a condition exhibiting one or more of the following characteristics over a long period of time and to a marked degree that adversely affects a child's educational performance: 1) inability to learn what cannot be explained

by intellectual, sensory, or health factors; 2) inability to build or maintain satisfactory interpersonal relationships with peers and teachers; 3) inappropriate types of behavior or feelings under normal circumstances: 4) a general pervasive mood of unhappiness or depression; 5) a tendency to develop physical symptoms or fears associated with personal or school problems. The term also includes schizophrenia. The term does not apply to children who are socially maladjusted unless it is determined they have a serious emotional disturbance. Speech or Language Impaired refers to a communication disorder such as stuttering. impaired articulation, language impairment, or a voice impairment that adversely affects a child's educational performance. Specific *Learning Disability* refers to a disorder in one or more of the basic psychological processes involved in understanding or in using language, spoken or written, that may manifest itself in an imperfect ability to listen, think, speak, read, write, spell, or do mathematical calculations. The term includes such conditions as perceptual disabilities, brain injury, minimal brain dysfunction, dyslexia, and developmental aphasia. The term does not apply to children who have learning problems that are primarily the result of visual, hearing, or motor disabilities; intellectual disability; emotional disturbance; or environmental, cultural, or economic disadvantage. Intellectual Disability refers to significantly sub-average general intellectual functioning existing with additional deficits in motor, emotional, and social development. *Autism* refers to a developmental disability significantly affecting verbal and nonverbal communication and social interaction, generally evident before age three, that adversely affects a child's educational performance. Other characteristics often associated with autism are engaging in repetitive activities and stereotyped movements, resistance to environmental change or change in daily routines, and unusual responses to sensory experiences. The term autism does not apply if the child's educational performance is adversely affected primarily because the child has an emotional disturbance, as defined by Emotionally Disturbed.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage for the main indicator is the proportion that special education enrollment represents of total

public school enrollment in respective geographic areas. The percentages for the age subcategories and the selected special education subcategories represent the proportion of the total child population enrolled in special education in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the school location, not the student's place of residence. DATE: December.

NOTE: Amendments to federal law removed the word "Seriously" from the subcategory *Emotionally Disturbed*. This name change was first reflected in the 2001 *Fact Book*. The definition of this special education subcategory was not affected. Beginning with the 2012 *Fact Book*, the subcategory *Mentally Handicapped* was changed, based on 2011 state legislation, to *Intellectual Disability*. The definition of this special education subcategory was not affected. SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Public Instruction, Special Education.

#### High School Dropouts, Grades 9-12

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children who dropped out of grades 9-12 during the academic year. PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion these children represent of total school enrollment for grades 9-12 in respective geographic areas. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the school location, not the student's place of residence. DATE: Academic Year (Fall through Spring).

LIMITATIONS: This number reflects dropout events during a given school year; it does not reflect the proportion of students who actually graduate four years after they begin high school. SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Public Instruction.

#### Average ACT Composite Scores

DEFINITION: This indicator represents average American College Testing (ACT) Program scores of graduating high school seniors in respective geographic areas. ACT scores are designed to predict a student's potential for success in college. The highest possible score one can obtain on the ACT exam is 36.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the high school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: High school graduating class of year presented.

NOTE: A law passed by the 2009 North Dakota Legislative Assembly requires high school students to take the ACT or the WorkKeys assessment (i.e., a job skills assessment system measuring "real-world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success). The first test under the mandate was in April 2010, affecting the scores for 2011 graduates.

#### Percent of High School Graduates Ready for College English

A score of 18 or better is the minimum score needed on the English portion of the ACT to indicate a 50 percent chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75 percent chance of obtaining a C or higher in the corresponding credit-bearing college course of English composition.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the high school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: High school graduating class of year presented.

NOTE: A law passed by the 2009 North Dakota Legislative Assembly requires high school students to take the ACT or the WorkKeys assessment (i.e., a job skills assessment system measuring "real-world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success). The first test under the mandate was in April 2010, affecting the scores for 2011 graduates.

# Percent of High School Graduates Ready for College Math

to measure what it takes to be successful in standard first-year college courses in the areas of English, math, reading, and science. A score of 22 or better is the minimum score needed on the math portion of the ACT to indicate a 50 percent chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75 percent chance of obtaining a C or higher in the corresponding credit-bearing college course of algebra. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the high school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: High school graduating class of year presented.

NOTE: A law passed by the 2009 North Dakota Legislative Assembly requires high school students to take the ACT or the WorkKeys assessment (i.e., a job skills assessment system measuring "real-world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success). The first test under the mandate was in April 2010, affecting the scores for 2011 graduates.

#### Percent of High School Graduates Ready for College Reading

GEOGRAPHY: County and regional data reflect the location of the high school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: High school graduating class of year presented.

NOTE: A law passed by the 2009 North Dakota Legislative Assembly requires high school students to take the ACT or the WorkKeys assessment (i.e., a job skills assessment system measuring "real-world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success). The first test under the mandate was in April 2010, affecting the scores for 2011 graduates.

#### Percent of High School Graduates Ready for College Science

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the proportion of all ACT-tested high school graduates who scored 24 or better on the science portion of the ACT exam. The ACT program has developed benchmarks to measure what it takes to be successful in standard first-year college courses in the areas of English, math, reading, and science. A score of 24 or better is the minimum score needed on the science portion of the ACT to indicate a 50 percent chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75 percent chance of obtaining a C or higher in the corresponding credit-bearing college course of biology. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the high school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: High school graduating class of year presented.

NOTE: A law passed by the 2009 North Dakota Legislative Assembly requires high school students to take the ACT or the WorkKeys assessment (i.e., a job skills assessment system measuring "real-world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success). The first test under the mandate was in April 2010, affecting the scores for 2011 graduates.

#### Percent of High School Graduates Ready for College in All Four Subject Areas

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the proportion of all ACT-tested high school graduates who scored all of the following: 18 or better on the English portion, 22 or better on the math portion, 21 or better on the reading portion, and 24 or better on the science portion of the ACT exam. The highest possible score one can obtain is 36. The ACT program has developed benchmarks to measure what it takes to be successful in standard first-year college courses in the areas of English, math, reading, and science. A benchmark score is the minimum score needed on an ACT subject-area test to indicate a 50 percent chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75 percent chance of obtaining a C or higher in the corresponding credit-bearing college courses, which include English composition, algebra, social science, and biology.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the high school, not the student's place of residence.

DATE: High school graduating class of year presented.

NOTE: A law passed by the 2009 North Dakota Legislative Assembly requires high school students to take the ACT or the WorkKeys assessment (i.e., a job skills assessment system measuring "real-world" skills that employers believe are critical to job success). The first test under the mandate was in April 2010, affecting the scores for 2011 graduates.

#### Licensed Child Care Providers

DEFINITION: This indicator represents individuals or facilities to whom the right, authority, or permission has been granted by the North Dakota Department of Human Services to operate a family child care home, group child care home or facility, child care center, preschool educational facility, school-age program, or multiple license facility. Child care providers who are licensed by the state and located on tribal lands are included in this category. A license is required if early childhood services are provided for four or more children ages 24 months and younger, or six or more children at any one time. A family child care home provider refers to an occupied private residence in which early childhood services are provided for no more than seven children at any one time (or four infants). This type of home may also be allowed to care for up to two additional school-aged children during the two hours immediately before and after the school day or all day (except weekends or when school is not in session). A group child care provider refers to an occupied private residence or other facility where early childhood services are provided for 8 to 18 children. A child care center refers to an early childhood facility where early childhood services are provided to 19 or more children based on available space. A preschool educational facility refers to a

facility offering early childhood services and following a preschool curriculum designed primarily to enhance the educational development of the children enrolled in the facility. Children are served for no more than three hours per day. A school-age program offers early childhood services to children before and after school and during school holidays and summer vacations. A multiple license facility refers to a child care facility with more than one type of license. *Licensed Child Care Capacity* is the number of children that can be served by licensed child care providers.

PERCENTAGE: There is no percentage calculated for the main indicator; the percentage for capacity is the proportion that licensed child care capacity (i.e., child care supply) represents of the total child population ages 0 to 13 where all parents in the household are in the labor force (i.e., potential child care demand) in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the child care program. A total of 48 licensed, out-of-state providers cared for North Dakota children in February 2013 and are included in the state total. These out-ofstate licensed providers had the capacity to care for 1,140 children.

DATE: February.

SOURCE: Child care numbers are obtained from the North Dakota Department of Human Services. The proportions are calculated based on an estimation of the number of children with working parents, derived from data obtained from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.

# Standard Compliance Certification (SCC) and In-Home Child Care Providers

DEFINITION: This indicator represents two types of non-licensed child care providers. Standard Compliance Certification, also referred to as Self-Certified, refers to child care providers who have completed an Affidavit of Standard Compliance and Child Care Provider Contract. This is a voluntary self-certification process for child care providers who are not licensed and care for five or fewer children, with no more than three children younger than 24 months of age. Registered In-Home child care providers offer child care services in the child's home. This title reflects a voluntary registration process for child care providers who are not licensed. Child care providers meeting these criteria and located on tribal lands are included in this category. *Standard Compliance Certification (SCC) and In-Home Child Care Capacity* is the number of children that can be served by standard compliance and registered in-home child care providers.

PERCENTAGE: There is no percentage calculated for the main indicator: the percentage for capacity is the proportion that standard compliance and registered in-home child care capacity (i.e., child care supply) represents of the total child population ages 0 to 13 where all parents in the household are in the labor force (i.e., potential child care demand) in respective geographic areas. **GEOGRAPHY:** Data reflect the location of the child care program. A total of four standard compliance, out-of-state providers cared for North Dakota children in February 2013 and are included in the state total. These out-of-state licensed providers had the capacity to care for 20 children. DATE: February.

SOURCE: Child care numbers are obtained from the North Dakota Department of Human Services. The proportions are calculated based on an estimation of the number of children with working parents, derived from data obtained from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.

#### **Registered Tribal Child Care Providers**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents tribal child care providers who are registered with the state of North Dakota, but are not licensed, self-certified, or approved relatives. Authority to provide child care is provided by the Tribal Council or designated Tribal Agency. Registered Tribal Child Care *Capacity* is the number of children that can be served by tribal child care providers who are registered with the state. PERCENTAGE: There is no percentage calculated for the main indicator; the percentage for capacity is the proportion that registered tribal child care capacity (i.e., child care supply) represents of the total child population ages 0 to 13 where all parents in the household are in the labor force (i.e., potential child care demand) in respective geographic areas. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the child care program. A total of one outof-state, registered tribal provider cared for

North Dakota children in February 2013 and is included in the state total. This out-ofstate licensed provider had the capacity to care for eight children.

#### DATE: February.

SOURCE: Child care numbers are obtained from the North Dakota Department of Human Services. The proportions are calculated based on an estimation of the number of children with working parents, derived from data obtained from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.

#### **Approved Relative Child Care Providers**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents a type of non-licensed child care provider. By federal law, the approved relatives must be related by marriage, blood relationship, or appointed by court order. Approved relative providers include grandparents, aunts, and uncles. A sibling who is age 18 or older and who does not live in the same home as the child for whom care is being provided can also become an approved relative. Approved relative child care providers located on tribal lands are included in this category. Approved Relative Child Care *Capacity* is the number of children that can be served by approved relative child care providers.

PERCENTAGE: There is no percentage calculated for the main indicator; the percentage for capacity is the proportion that approved relative child care capacity (i.e., child care supply) represents of the total child population ages 0 to 13 where all parents in the household are in the labor force (i.e., potential child care demand) in respective geographic areas..

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the child care program. A total of eight approved relative, out-of-state providers cared for North Dakota children in February 2013 and are included in the state total. These out-of-state licensed providers had the capacity to care for 23 children. DATE: February.

SOURCE: Child care numbers are obtained from the North Dakota Department of Human Services. The proportions are calculated based on an estimation of the number of children with working parents, derived from data obtained from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates.

### HEALTH

## Births to Mothers Receiving Inadequate Prenatal Care

DEFINITION: This indicator is calculated using the Kessner Index, a method of categorizing adequacy of prenatal care, based on month of pregnancy care started, number of visits, and length of gestation. This index adjusts for the fact that women with short gestations have less time in which to make prenatal care visits. Inadequate prenatal care is defined as: 1) gestational age 14-21 weeks with no prenatal visits; 2) gestational age 22-29 weeks with one or fewer visits; 3) gestational age 30-31 weeks with two or fewer prenatal visits; 4) gestational age 32-33 weeks with three or fewer prenatal visits; 5) gestational age 34+ weeks with four or fewer prenatal visits. PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion births to mothers receiving inadequate prenatal care represent of total resident live births in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the mother's place of residence rather than the location of the hospital where the birth occurred. DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Data are not reported for geographies where the number of births to mothers receiving inadequate prenatal care is one through five. In these cases, <6 is indicated.

SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Health, Division of Vital Records.

#### Low Weight Births

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of babies who weigh less than 2,500 grams (5 pounds, 8 ounces) at birth, as recorded by birth certificates. PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion low weight births represent of total resident live births in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the mother's place of residence rather than the location of the hospital where the birth occurred. DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Data are not reported for geographies where the number of low weight births is one through five. In these cases, <6 is indicated.

#### Deaths of Infants Less Than 1 Year of Age

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of deaths occurring to infants less than 1 year of age, as recorded on death certificates.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion infant deaths represent of total resident live births in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data are reported by the infant's place of residence rather than the location of death.

DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Data are not reported for geographies where the number of infant deaths is one through five. In these cases, <6 is indicated.

SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Health, Division of Vital Records.

#### **Deaths of Children Ages 1-19**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of deaths for children ages 1 through 19, as recorded on death certificates. PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion child deaths represent of total deaths in respective geographic areas. GEOGRAPHY: Data are reported by the child's place of residence rather than the location of death.

DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Data are not reported for geographies where the number of child deaths is one through five. In these cases, <6 is indicated.

SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Health, Division of Vital Records.

#### Newborns Receiving a Hearing Screening,

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of newborns receiving a hearing screening before being discharged from the hospital. *Did Not Pass the Initial Hearing Screening* represents the number of children that were screened for hearing loss and identified as having some form of hearing impairment, and were referred for further testing.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage for the main indicator is the proportion these births represent of total resident live births as reported by the EHDI information system in respective geographic areas. The percentage for the subcategory reflects the proportion of all screened births that did not pass the screening.

GEOGRAPHY: Data include births to North Dakota residents and are presented based on the mother's/guardian's county of residence. Out-of-state births to North Dakota residents are excluded.

DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Data are not reported for geographies where the number of screened births is one through five. In these cases, <6 is indicated.

SOURCE: North Dakota Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI), North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities, Minot State University.

#### Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Program Participants

DEFINITION: This indicator represents persons who are eligible for and receive a food voucher and nutrition education contract through the WIC Program. The WIC Program provides coupons for specific foods to low-income pregnant and postpartum women, infants, and children younger than five years. To be eligible for WIC, low-income women, infants, and children must be found to be at nutritional risk for medical or dietary reasons. WIC is a prevention program targeted to provide nutrition education, nutritious food, and access to health care. WIC is not an entitlement program.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the participant's place of residence.

DATE: Fiscal Year (July 1 through June 30). LIMITATIONS: Fort Berthold and Standing Rock Indian reservations administer their own programs. Thus, data for these two reservations are not included in the state WIC numbers. North Dakota WIC data do cover the Spirit Lake and Turtle Mountain reservations as well as the Trenton Indian Service Area.

SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Health, Division of Nutrition and Physical Activity, WIC Program.

#### Medicaid Recipients Ages 0-20

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of persons ages 0 through 20 who are recipients of Medicaid. Medicaid is a federally funded entitlement program available to eligible persons based upon

need. It is designed to assist individuals and families who do not have enough income to obtain health care. Medicaid is authorized by Title XIX, a 1965 amendment to the federal Social Security Act. Eligible persons include those receiving TANF or Social Security Income (SSI) payments; those terminated by TANF and in transition for 4 to 12 months; elderly, blind, or disabled people with low incomes; persons institutionalized, in foster homes, and certain adoptive children; pregnant women; and women with children ages 0 to 6. Medicaid differs from Medicare, which is a federally funded program for the elderly and disabled. PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion recipients represent of the total population ages 0 through 20 in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of residence.

DATE: Fiscal Year (July 1 through June 30). SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Human Services.

# Children Ages 0-18 Enrolled in Healthy Steps

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children under the age of 19 who are enrolled in the North Dakota Healthy Steps Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Healthy Steps, North Dakota's health insurance plan for children, provides premium-free health coverage to uninsured children in qualifying families. It is intended to help meet the health care needs of children from working families that earn too much to qualify for full Medicaid coverage, but not enough to afford private insurance.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion children enrolled in Healthy Steps represent of the total child population ages 0 through 18 in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of residence.

DATE: January.

NOTE: Coverage is available for uninsured children ages 18 and younger who live in families with qualifying incomes. Single 18-year-olds with eligible incomes may also apply. The income guidelines are established by the North Dakota Legislature using the Federal Poverty Level. To qualify, a family's net income (after subtracting child care costs and payroll taxes such as social security tax, Medicare tax, and income tax) must be greater than the Medicaid level, but cannot exceed 160% of the federal poverty level.

#### **Uninsured Children Ages 0-18**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children under the age of 19 who are not covered by health insurance. *At or Below 200% of Poverty* represents the number of children under the age of 19 who are not covered by health insurance and are living in families with incomes at or below 200% of the federal poverty level (i.e., families with incomes less than twice the federal poverty level).

PERCENTAGE: The percentage for the main indicator is the proportion these children represent of the total child population ages 0 through 18 in respective geographic areas. The percentage for the subcategory of uninsured children at or below 200% of poverty is the proportion these children represent of all uninsured children ages 0 through 18.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of residence.

DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: The estimates are based on statistical models and are subject to modeling error. For the 90% confidence intervals associated with state and countylevel data, visit http://www.census.gov/did/ www/sahie/.

NOTE: The estimates are based on statistical models using estimates of income and poverty from the Annual Social and Economic Supplement (a U.S. Census Bureau survey).

### SAFETY AND RISKY BEHAVIOR

#### **Child Abuse and Neglect Reports**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the total number of official assessments made to the North Dakota Department of Human Services (NDDHS) on behalf of a child where there is the suspicion of child abuse or neglect. Child abuse and neglect refers to any recent act or failure to act on the part of a parent or caregiver which results in death, serious physical or emotional harm, sexual abuse or exploitation, or an act or failure to act which presents an imminent risk of serious harm.

Physical harm refers to any non-accidental physical injury to the child, and can include striking, kicking, burning, or biting the child, or any action that results in a physical impairment of the child. Sexual abuse involves sexual contact between a child and an adult or significantly older. more powerful person. Sexual abuse may include other exploitative behaviors such as inappropriate sexual comments made to a child, taking or showing sexually explicit photographs or exposing a child to pornography or adult sexual activity. Emotional harm refers to injury to the psychological capacity or emotional stability of the child as evidenced by an observable or substantial change in behavior, emotional response or cognition, or as evidenced by anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or aggressive behavior. A neglected child, also referred to as a deprived child, refers to a child who 1) is without proper parental care or control, subsistence, education, or other care or control necessary for the child's physical, mental, emotional health. or morals, and the deprivation is not due primarily to the lack of financial means of the child's parents, guardian, or other custodian; 2) has been placed for care or adoption in violation of law; 3) is without proper parental care, control, education. or other care and control necessary for the child's well-being because of the physical, mental, emotional, or other illness or disability of the child's parent or parents, and that such lack of care is not due to a willful act of commission or act of omission by the child's parents, and care is requested by a parent; 4) is in need of treatment and whose parents, guardian, or other custodian have refused to participate in treatment as ordered by the juvenile court; 5) was subject to prenatal exposure to chronic and severe use of alcohol or any controlled substance in a manner not lawfully prescribed by a practitioner; 6) is present in an environment subjecting the child to exposure to a controlled substance or drug paraphernalia. Abandonment of a child refers to a situation in which 1) the parent's identity

or whereabouts are unknown, 2) the child has been left by the parent in circumstances where the child suffers serious harm, or 3) the parent has failed to maintain contact with the child or to provide reasonable support for a specified period of time.

The North Dakota Century Code mandates certain persons (those who have contact with children as a part of their professional duties) to report incidents of suspected child abuse or neglect. Any person may report an incident. The NDDHS or its designated agent, a regional or county Child Protection Service (CPS) social worker, will respond to the report by conducting an assessment of the family being reported. This process allows for the assessment of present safety of the child(ren) and the risk of future maltreatment, while simultaneously noting family strengths and needs. These strengths, along with any necessary service interventions, may lead to the amelioration of child maltreatment within a particular family. The CPS social workers use a risk assessment tool to help direct the intervention and assessment process. CPS teams determine if 1) services are required or 2) services are not required. Services are required if a high level of risk is determined to exist for the child(ren). and/or the family's needs are such that immediate service is required in order to lessen the safety risk. When it is determined that services are required, North Dakota Century Code requires a referral to Juvenile Court and a social worker (case manager) must be assigned to coordinate services. If no services are required, it has been determined that 1) no to low risk for the child(ren) exists; and/or 2) the CPS team suggests a discussion with the family on the availability of services, which are unrelated to any specific risk factors; or 3) the family's service need is nonexistent. Services may be offered or recommended to the family even though no services are required for the protection of a child.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the assessment.

DATE: Federal Fiscal Year (October 1 through September 30).

LIMITATIONS: Reports of child abuse and neglect from tribal lands are processed separately and are not included in these numbers. Data are not reported for geographies where the number of child abuse and neglect reports is five or less.

In these cases, <6 is indicated. Data for planning regions are suppressed entirely to avoid disclosure of suppressed county data. NOTE: In an effort to coordinate with federal reporting procedures, data regarding child abuse and neglect are presented for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) (October-September) rather than for the Calendar Year (CY) (January-December). While trends are consistent between the two reporting procedures, please use caution when comparing FFY data (first reported in the 2007 Fact Book) with CY data which were reported prior to the 2007 Fact Book. ## Suspected Victims of Child Abuse and Neglect

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children involved in assessments made to the North Dakota Department of Human Services (NDDHS) where there is the suspicion of child abuse or neglect (see the Child Abuse and Neglect Reports indicator definition for detailed definitions of abuse and neglect and a description of the assessment process). Child Protection Service (CPS) social workers use a risk assessment tool to help direct the intervention and assessment process. CPS teams determine if 1) services are required or 2) services are not required. When there are Victims in Cases Where Services Are Required, a high level of risk is determined to exist for the child(ren), and/or the family's needs are such that immediate service is required in order to lessen the safety risk. When it is determined that services are required, North Dakota Century Code requires a referral to Juvenile Court and a social worker (case manager) must be assigned to coordinate services (see the Child Abuse and Neglect Reports indicator definition for detailed definitions of other CPS determinations).

PERCENTAGE: The percentage for the main indicator is the proportion that children who are suspected victims represent of the total child population ages 0 through 17 in respective geographic areas. The percentage for victims in cases where services are required is the proportion these children represent of total suspected child victims in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the location of the assessment.

DATE: Federal Fiscal Year (October 1 through September 30).

LIMITATIONS: Reports of child abuse and neglect from tribal lands are processed separately and are not included in these numbers. Data are not reported for geographies where the number of child abuse and neglect victims is five or less. In these cases, <6 is indicated. Data for planning regions are suppressed entirely to avoid disclosure of suppressed county data. NOTE: In an effort to coordinate with federal reporting procedures, data regarding child abuse and neglect are presented for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) (October-September) rather than for the Calendar Year (CY) (January-December). While trends are consistent between the two reporting procedures, please use caution when comparing FFY data (first reported in the 2007 Fact Book) with CY data which were reported prior to the 2007 Fact Book. SOURCE: North Dakota Department of Human Services, Children and Family Services.

# Children Directly Impacted by Domestic Violence

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children affected by domestic violence occurring in their homes. Domestic violence typically refers to the use or threat of physical force against a current or former partner in an intimate relationship, resulting in fear and/or physical suffering on the part of the victim and witnessing household members.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion these children represent of all children ages 0 through 17 in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect place of residence and include North Dakota countyspecific numbers only. Thus, incidents impacting North Dakota children living outof-state are not included in these numbers. DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: This indicator includes data from Spirit Lake Reservation, but excludes data from Fort Berthold, Trenton Service Area, Turtle Mountain, Lake Traverse, and Standing Rock reservations. Data are not reported for geographies where the number of children impacted by domestic violence is one through five. In these cases, <6 is indicated.

#### Children Ages 10-17 Referred to Juvenile Court

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of juveniles ages 10 through 17 referred to Juvenile Court in the reference year. It excludes children in cases involving abandonment, abuse/neglect, deprivation, file 960 (when no further action is recommended), educational neglect, other or no fault deprivation, termination of parental rights, or other special proceedings. PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion referrals to juvenile court represent of the total child population ages 10 through 17 in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the offense location, not the juvenile's place of residence. In addition, the number of juveniles is unduplicated only at the county level of geography. Approximately 6% of juvenile offenders were referred to court in multiple counties in 2012. In these cases, each juvenile is counted once for each county in which they are referred. Because the regional and state level data are a sum of the counties, these multi-county offenders are duplicated at the regional and state levels of geography.

DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Referrals made to the four tribal courts in North Dakota are not included in this indicator.

NOTE: A new reporting procedure for juvenile court referrals and offenses was implemented by the North Dakota Supreme Court beginning with 2003 data. In this new reporting procedure, the data reflect the year in which the case was referred to court, not the year when the case was settled (disposition date). This reporting procedure affects data that were first reported by North Dakota KIDS COUNT in the 2005 *Fact Book*. Thus, caution should be used when making comparisons to data presented in *Fact Books* prior to the 2005 publication. SOURCE: North Dakota Supreme Court, State Court Administrator's Office.

#### **Juvenile Court Referrals**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents all cases referred to juvenile court along with the description of the major offense associated with each referral. A juvenile referred to court may be charged with multiple offenses; however, only a description of the major offense for each referral is provided. Offenses are incidents that require referral to Juvenile Court; referrals can be made by police, parents, school teachers/officials, or other sources. These referrals exclude cases involving abandonment, abuse/neglect, deprivation, file 960 (when no further action is recommended), educational neglect, other or no fault deprivations, termination of parental rights, or other special proceedings. Alcohol Offense includes the purchase or possession of alcohol by a minor, delivery of alcohol to a minor, minor in a liquor establishment, and minor in possession/consumption. Unruly Behavior includes runaways in- and outof-state, truancy, ungovernable behavior, violation of conditions for conduct and control, violation of curfew, and other unruly behavior. Offense Against Person includes assault, homicide, kidnapping or unlawful restraint, sex offenses, and other offenses against a person. Offense Against *Property* includes arson or endangering by fire, burglary, criminal mischief or damaging property, criminal trespass, forgery and counterfeiting, robbery, shoplifting, theft (other than shoplifting), unauthorized use of vehicle, and other offenses against property. Other Offense includes disorderly conduct, possession or purchase of controlled substances, cruelty to animals, tobacco purchase/smoking, resisting arrest, driving under the influence, driving without a license, open container, carrying a concealed weapon, illegal possession of a firearm, and all other offenses not contained in the above categories.

PERCENTAGE: There is no percentage calculated for the main indicator. The percentages for the major offense subcategories represent the proportion that referrals in each major offense category represent of total juvenile court referrals in respective geographic areas. GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the offense location, not the juvenile's place of residence.

DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Referrals made to the four tribal courts in North Dakota are not included in this indicator. NOTE: A new reporting procedure for juvenile court referrals was implemented by the North Dakota Supreme Court beginning with 2003 data. In this new reporting procedure, the data reflect the year in which the case was referred to court, not the year when the case was settled (disposition date). This reporting procedure affects data that were first reported by North Dakota KIDS COUNT in the 2005 Fact Book. Thus, caution should be used when making comparisons to data presented in Fact Books prior to the 2005 publication. In Fact *Books* prior to the 2006 publication, type of offense subcategories were incorrectly reported under the Juvenile Offenses indicator. In addition, prior to the 2006 publication, when a referral had multiple charges, the major offense description for the referral was inappropriately applied to each of the individual charges associated with that referral, which provided an inaccurate representation of the various offenses being committed, and overrepresenting the main offense. Now, only the major offense is represented. Thus, comparisons to offense subcategory data in Fact Books prior to the 2006 publication should not be made.

#### **Juvenile Offenses**

DEFINITION: This indicator represents all offenses associated with juvenile court referrals. This indicator may be larger than the number of actual referrals, as one referral may have multiple offenses. Juvenile offenses exclude referral cases involving abandonment, abuse/neglect, deprivation, file 960 (when no further action is recommended), educational neglect, other or no fault deprivations, termination of parental rights, or other special proceedings. PERCENTAGE: There is no percentage calculated for this indicator.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the offense location, not the juvenile's place of residence.

DATE: Calendar Year (January 1 through December 31).

LIMITATIONS: Offenses from referrals made to the four tribal courts in North Dakota are not included in this indicator. NOTE: A new reporting procedure for juvenile court referrals was implemented by the North Dakota Supreme Court beginning with 2003 data. In this new reporting procedure, the data reflect the year in which

the case was referred to court, not the year when the case was settled (disposition date). This new reporting procedure affects data that were first reported by North Dakota KIDS COUNT in the 2005 Fact Book. Thus, caution should be used when making comparisons to data presented in Fact Books prior to the 2005 publication. The various types of offenses are no longer presented as subcategories of the Juvenile Offenses indicator, as they were in Fact Book publications prior to 2006. Rather, a description of the major offense for each referral is now reported under the Juvenile Court Referrals by Major Offense indicator (a new indicator for the 2006 Fact Book). #### Children Ages 16-19 Not Enrolled in High School, Not High School Graduates, and Not in the Labor Force

DEFINITION: This indicator represents the number of children ages 16 through 19 who have not completed high school, are not enrolled in school, and are not in the labor force.

PERCENTAGE: The percentage is the proportion these children represent of the total child population ages 16 through 19 in respective geographic areas.

GEOGRAPHY: Data reflect the child's place of residence.

DATE: Data represent a 5-year period estimate. For example, 2011 estimates reflect data collected over a 60-month period from 2007 to 2011.

LIMITATIONS: Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. A 90% margin of error for each estimate can be found at http://www.ndkidscount. org/publications.html. Characteristics for geographic areas experiencing dynamic change due to such things as an environmental catastrophe (e.g., flood) or a plant closing will be mitigated since these estimates cover five calendar years of data. Also, caution is needed when using the multiyear estimates for estimating year-toyear change in a particular characteristic. This is because four of the five years in the 5-year estimate overlap with the next year's estimate. Ideally, trend analysis with multiyear estimates should be done using estimates from non-overlapping periods (i.e., 2005-2009 and 2010-2014).
